

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21 .--- The house committee on industrial arts and expositions this afternoon unantmously approved the bill appropriating \$2,000,000 for a government exhibit at the San Francisco exposition in 1915.

There were no material amendments to the Rodenberg bill as favorably reported by the committees. It provides for a commission of seven members to be appointed by the president and a government board, composed of employes of varies Federal departments to collect and install the exhibits.
