## MEDFORD DOCTOR IN CHARGE OF HOSPITAL

## DR. REDDY BUYS RANCH NEAR CRESCENT CITY

CRESCENT CITY, Jan. 23.—By far the most important deal in real estate that has been made in this section for some time is under way and will probably be completed by the last of this week, the same being the sale of the Robert Walton ranch to Dr. J. F. Reddy and others.  
The property is just outside of Crescent City, on the Grants Pass road, and consists of approximately 199 acres. Mr. Walton reserves five acres of ground for a home. The price paid was \$20,000.

### DIED.

Stephen S. Enney was born at Oswego, N. Y., Oct. 15, 1836, and died at Medford, Ore., Jan. 20, 1913, at the residence of his son-in-law H. S. Brumble.  
When about eight years of age he, with his parents, moved to Aurora, Ill. He was converted at South Elgin, Ill., under the labors of C. E. Harroun, at the age of 23, afterwards joining the Free Methodist church at that place as a charter member.  
On May 12, 1862, he was married to Margaret M. Buck, at that time moving to Havanna, Minn., where they lived 16 years, later making their home in Dakota 14 years, when in 1889 they moved to Medford, Ore., where they lived until his death.  
When the Free Methodist church at Medford was organized Mr. Enney was again one of the charter members, remaining a faithful member to the last.  
The latter part of last August he was taken sick with dropsy. During his long sickness he always displayed a patient Christian submissiveness. Towards the last bidding relatives and friends goodbye, never failing to hold up Christ and his salvation to all.  
He leaves to mourn his death his wife, two daughters, Mrs. Cora F. Wilson and Mrs. Mable E. Brumble, with their families; a brother and sister in Port Angeles, Wash., and a brother in Lansing, Minn.  
The funeral services were conducted from the Free Methodist church by Rev. W. E. Goode, assisted by Rev. W. F. Shields, Rev. M. F. Childs and Rev. J. W. Sharpe. Text: Sam. 3:38, "Know ye not that there is a prince and a great man fallen this day in Israel?"
