SAYS BISHOP HAS EARNED PLACE IN CRATER FOREST

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24.—Secretary of Agriculture Wilson told Representative Hawley last year when the Oregon man urged the secretary to order a patent granted to St. George Bishop on his homestead in the Crater national forest, to go and see the place himself, and if he then would recommend issuance of a patent, the secretary would order it issued. This claim has been held up by the forest service, although it is claimed Bishop has lived on it 10 years, cleared a considerable portion and built a good house, which he uses in the season as a hotel. He claims to have spent \$6000 on it.

Hawley visited the place last summer, and yesterday he called on Secretary Wilson, explained the conditions, and expressed the opinion that it would be unjust to allow the forest service to take Bishop's claim for use as a ranger station, even though campers may be permitted to use it free, as is said to be the plan of the forest service. Chief Forester Graves was present and opposed Hawley.

MAIL CARRIER HAS HARD TRIP IN SNOW

The residents of the lower Rogue river points are experiencing a great deal of difficulty in getting mail from the outside world these days, the trail over the divide to West Fork being practically impassable. Forest Supervisor Macduff at Grants Pass received a letter from Charles H. Pettinger, written from West Fork on the arrival of Mr. Pettinger there with the mail, that records a trip of hardship over the route from Blaine to West Fork. As long as the trail followed the Rogue there was no difficulty in travel, and the mail was carried along by horse, but the trip over the divide had to be made on snow shoes, and Mr. Pettinger with the first-class mail, arrived at his destination at 1:30 o'clock in the morning in an "all-in" condition. He reported five feet of snow at Globe Springs and ten feet or more on the divide with snow still falling. He wrote to Mr. Macduff that the latter could phone down the river from here and tell the people there that he would not return till the going was better.

ANDERSON AND TROTT ARE READY FOR GO TOMORROW

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 24.—Sammy Trott and Bud Anderson are ready for the struggle that will make one of them a contender for a place in the upper flight of the lightweight pugilistic division. Each man has completed his training and will rest until sent into the ring at Vernon tomorrow afternoon in a scheduled 20-round match. Anderson has created more interest here than any fighter who has come practically unheralded to Los Angeles for many months. The unusually loyal support of Oregon and Washington sports who are here for the battle and the remarkable record the boy has made in those states has stimulated this interest. Much money has been wagered on his chances at 10 to 7. Trott supporters call attention to the fact that Anderson has met practically no first-class lightweights and believe that their man's long ring experience and the resultant generalship will prove too much for Anderson. The winner of tomorrow's battle probably will be matched with Joe Mandot for an early date, the winner to get Joe Rivers late in April. Jack Britton may be substituted for Mandot in the second round of the elimination series. The boys will weigh in at 133 pounds at 10 o'clock and will enter the ring about 8:15. They will divide half the receipts, 60 per cent to the winner and 40 per cent to the loser.
