"There will be 100,000 visitors in Washington on that day and it will be impossible to have a reception at the White House. There should be no reception except those on a democratic basis."

ALL PUPILS PASS 8TH GRADE EXAMS

In the Eighth Grade state examination just completed, every pupil of that grade in the Medford schools succeeded in passing same without condition. Not a single one of the 29 participating failed in a single subject. This is a phenomenal record and reflects credit not only upon the pupils but the efficiency of the public schools as well.

When we take into consideration the large number taking this examination, it is doubtful if there is another school in the state that can show such a record. Certainly, it cannot be excelled.

Of the 29 taking the examination, 19 passed with averages over 90 per cent, and the remainder with averages better than 80 per cent.
