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WIPE OUT THIS PEST.

WITH an improvement in realty conditions in the valley it is inevitable that the obnoxious pest, the real estate "crabber" should again make himself apparent. He is the curbstone artist who spends his time getting wind of deals being made by reputable men and who then threatens to block everything unless he is given a part of the commission. Within the past two weeks several important deals, transactions that would have meant something real to the valley, have been so blocked because, in these cases those behind the deals, would not agree to be robbed of a part of the legitimate commission.

The real estate dealer of this variety not only spoils many a good sale, but he boosts the commissions beyond the fair and reasonable limit. He is a menace to the health of the real estate business and a pest to the community. In former years the city has seen enough of this shyster crew and experience has proven that it will work great harm if he again be allowed to operate here.

The names of every one of these men should be made public property, the legitimate dealers should unite to drive them out, for Medford will not stand for the crimes formerly committed in the guise of real estate transactions.

GOVERNOR'S SECRETARY TO GET \$3000 A YEAR

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 31.—Senator Calkin's bill fixing the salary of the governor's private secretary at \$3000 a year was passed by the senate today.

Another bill passed was one introduced by President Malarkey and Senator Butler fixing sever penalties on officers of banks who accept gratuities from prospective depositors of money, or sellers of securities to banks, and upon outsiders who offer to pay such favors.

Seventeen bills in all were passed by the senate today before that body adjourned until Monday.

SCHRICKER COMPLETES THREE DAY TESTIMONY

BELLINGHAM, Wash., Jan. 31.—W. E. Schriker, the convicted Laconer banker whom the state made its own witness in the bank conspiracy trial here, involving Jacob Furth, R. V. Ankeny, E. W. Andrews and Daniel Kelleher, officers of the Seattle National Bank, concluded his testimony at 11:15 this morning. He had been questioned for four days, only two witnesses called out of turn, breaking the continuity of his testimony. These were Representative W. W. Conner of Skagitaw county, who testified to Ankeny's counselling him to deposit with the Schriker bank, and Mrs. Inez Sollars of Laconer, a telephone girl, who testified to overhearing inadvertently part of a telephone conversation between Andrews and Schriker a day before Schriker's bank was closed.

MIXTURE OF THE RACES IS LEADING TO TROUBLE

PORT DARWIN, Australia, Jan. 31 The mixing of white people, Chinese and aboriginals in the less civilized portions of the northern territory is regarded with serious eyes, owing to the fact that a piebald population is springing up in this sparsely populated portion of the commonwealth. One result of this state of affairs has been a great difficulty in governing the territory, owing to the fact that the mixed population is unsympathetic toward the administration. There are 4000 white women in the territory, a fair sprinkling of Chinese and thousands of blacks.

\$5,000,000 IS PAID FOR HUGE OIL COMPANIES

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 31.—To further develop the Midway and other oil fields of California, the Oil Producers and Refiners, Limited, a big London syndicate, has today taken over the United Oil company of Los Angeles and the North American Oil Consolidated, and Section Two Syndicate, of San Francisco, the consideration being \$5,000,000. The deal has been pending for months.

The London concern is headed by Crowther, the British oil king. The enlarged concern will be known as the United Oil company. The North American company was headed by Louis Titus, of Oakland, and the Section Two Syndicate by San Francisco oil magnates. The United company sold for \$2,225,000 and the other two for \$2,750,000.

MAN WANTED AT LOS ANGELES IS NABBED ACROSS SEAS

LONDON, Jan. 31.—Victor Clement Fisher, wanted in Los Angeles for alleged embezzlement, was arrested here today on an extradition warrant. He was remanded to jail pending an investigation. Fisher is charged with embezzlement of \$25,000 from a Los Angeles concern.

Chamberlain Helps Soldier

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—If a bill introduced by Senator Chamberlain is passed, Brig. General Thomas A. Anderson of San Francisco will be given the rating of Major General on the retired list of the army. General Anderson served in the Spanish and Philippine wars.

The car in which they left New York in June, 1911, for England is the car in which they returned to New York. No part of it had been renewed, except its tires. In their wanderings Mr. Hall and his mother drove their car approximately, 40,000 miles. It has been estimated they travelled in thirty-three countries and used more than 5,000 gallons of gasoline.

HEAVYWEIGHT BILLS ARE PASSED OVER VETO

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 31.—The house today passed two bills over the veto of Governor West. The bills were passed at the last session of the legislature.

Both bills were of the "heavy-weight" type of legislation. One of them requires station agents to post notices of the arrival and departure of trains, while the other will compel the farmer to get out in the road that adjoins or runs through his property and grub the weeds and thistles out of it.

Coal Must Be Certified

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—Notification was received from Greece by the state department today that coal shipped via the Dardanelles to Black Sea ports will be liable to seizure by Greek warships unless it is certified to be for consumption at neutral ports.

Wells to Meet McCarthy

NEW YORK, Jan. 31.—Bombardier Wells, heavyweight champion of England, and Luther McCarthy, who holds a like title in America, have been matched for a 10 round fight in Madison Square Garden here late in March or early in April, according to a cable today from London.
