

### TEST ELECTRICIANS ORDINANCE SOON

The first test of the new electrician's code as defined in the ordinance passed at the last council meeting is to be made shortly when D. C. McAlpine will appear to answer charges preferred by Electrical Inspector Herndon. The outcome of the case hinges on a point of law as to whether the ordinance is effective at passage or not until ten days after. City Attorney Boggs holds that the new ordinance became immediately effective whereas Porter J. Neff, McAlpine's attorney, is of the opinion that an error in the emergency clause makes the ordinance ineffective for ten days. There will be no necessity of changing the ordinance as, in any case, it becomes rigid after the ten days from passage are up. The case has been continued until an indefinite date.

Castro appeared before United States Judge Holt and obtained an order admitting him to \$500 bail pending a hearing Friday on an application for a writ of habeas corpus.

### STARTING AS A BRAKEMAN AT \$1.62 A DAY, BECOMES VICE PRESIDENT AT \$25,000 A YEAR

With a view to relieving Charles S. Mellen, president of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad, of much of the responsibility which he has been shouldering for several years, the directors of the New Haven road have elected Adelbert H. Whaley vice president in charge of operations. Mr. Whaley will be in the big office building which adjoins the new Grand Central Station in New York, and from there will direct operations over the entire stretch of the New Haven road. The position was created for Mr. Whaley by the Board of Directors, as he succeeds no one and begins his work as the first active vice president the road has had. Mr. Mellen will continue active as president of the road and will make his headquarters in New Haven, as heretofore, but his activity will be along the line of giving advice in matters from a brakeman's job at \$1.62 a day to vice president at \$25,000 a year is the story of Mr. Whaley's financial change within thirty-four years.

### ASK BIDS FOR NEW BRIDGE OVER ROGUE
