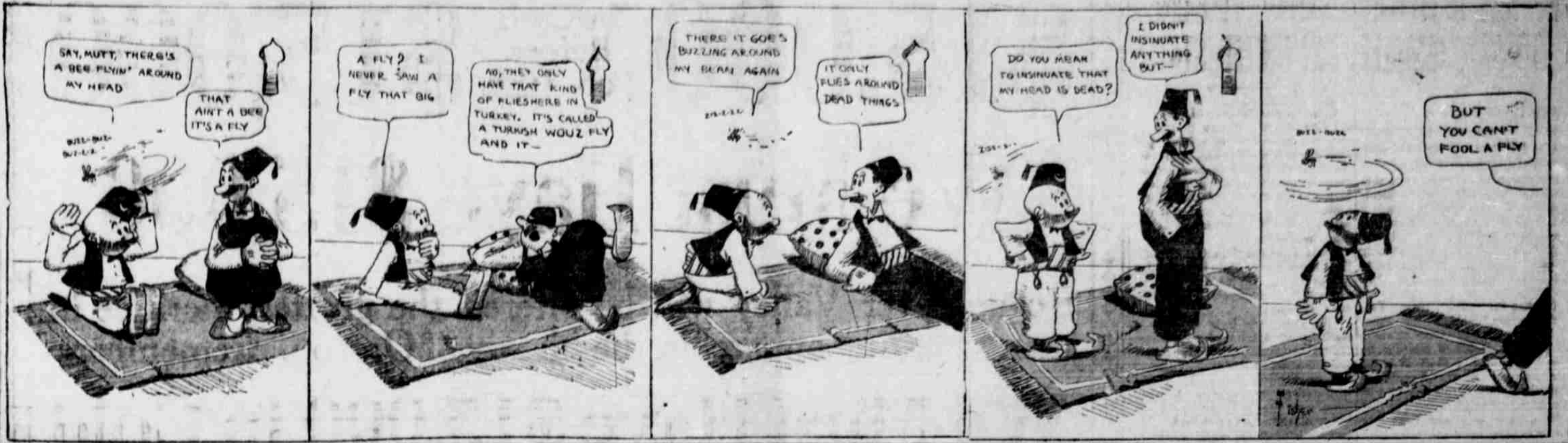

IRRIGATION BONDS MAY BE PROVIDED

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 31.—Issuing of bonds by the state for the development of water power for irrigation and manufacturing purposes is today given the stamp of approval by the senate judiciary committee. It was unanimously agreed to give a favorable report on Senator Thompson's resolution to submit a constitutional amendment to the people on the lines mentioned. This amendment would lift the ban on the \$50,000 limit of state indebtedness for the purposes named, the chief objections of which would be irrigation development in eastern Oregon and the big water power project at Celilo. If the legislature approves, the question will be submitted to the people in 1914.

AVIATOR GREET'S PARTY OF WORLD TOURISTS

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 31.—World tourists aboard the steamer Cleveland which arrived here today were treated to a thrilling spectacle as the vessel came up the bay. Aviator Christofferson flew over the steamer in his hydroplane and dropped a letter of welcome to the deck from Mayor Rolph. The daring sky pilot then circled the vessel several times and alighted gracefully on the bay.
