

WILSON DECLARES HE HAS A LITTLE TO SAY, HIMSELF

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 31.—Angered by morning newspaper reports that he definitely had decided to appoint Wm. J. Bryan secretary of state and had sent him a message to that effect by Colonel House, President-elect Woodrow Wilson today made it plain here that he would name his own cabinet and was not limited to suggestions from others in forming his official family. Wilson came to Philadelphia to visit the family dentist.

"I notice the morning papers definitely declare," said Wilson, "that Mr. Bryan will be secretary of state, and that I sent him a message by Colonel House. The story is based entirely on the fact that I could not recall the names of other men who have been suggested to me for that position. I want to say right here that there is no justification for such inferences.

"In the first place I doubt if I could recall the names of the men who have been suggested to me for any one cabinet position. In the second place, I want it distinctly understood that I am not limited to suggestions in making up my cabinet. I reserve the privilege of making some suggestions myself and might appoint men who never have been suggested to me."

DARROW CASE IS OPENED AT LAST

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 31.—The trial proper of Clarence Darrow on a charge of bribing Robert F. Bain, a McNamara juror, began today with the taking of testimony. The jury was completed late yesterday after four regular and one special venire had been utilized, a 13th or alternate juror being accepted just before adjournment.

George O. Monroe, clerk in Superior Judge Mordwell's court, during the trial of the McNamara brothers, in which case Bain was a juror, was expected to be the first witness. Monroe's duty was largely to fix the facts of the McNamara trial, establish necessary chronology and to affirm that Bain was a juror in that trial. It is believed that upon the conclusion of Monroe's testimony the state will go at once to the point of its case and bring out its important witness. Both sides predicted an early completion of the trial.

HOBOS LEARN NEW TACTICS FROM WOMEN

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 31.—Shooting acid into the letter boxes, sending bricks through plate glass windows and other "suffragette" methods are to be employed by hobos in states having strict vagrancy laws. This is the stand taken today by the Hobo Convention here. Many of the laws make no distinction between the hobo who wants to work and the "bum" who don't, is the claim.

PLAN ATTACK ON ALL SONORA TOWNS

DOUGLAS, Ariz., Jan. 31.—Inez Salazar, leader of the Mexican rebels in the vicinity of Juarez, is planning a concerted attack upon northern Sonora towns, according to messages received today by private interests here. Salazar's dominion about Juarez, is claimed, was ordered to draw troops away from Sonora.

"MONEY TRUST" IN CANADA LIKE ONE IN UNITED STATES

OTTAWA, Ont., Jan. 31.—Charging that a score of men practically dominate the industrial and moneyed activities of all Canada, and that the baneful influence of the American "money trust" is easily paralleled here, Hon. H. R. Emerson, liberal, attacked the new bank bill when it was called up for second reading in the commons today.

Emerson declared that the conditions barred by the Pajo investigation in the United States are no whit worse than those which throttle Canada. He said:

"We Canadians have come to a condition of affairs where 23 men control our financial, transportation and industrial institutions. These 23 men, as directors, control 121 of the corporations of Canada. Nine of these men live in Toronto, 13 in Montreal and one in England. This same evil forces are working here as in the United States, and this measure, if passed, will only tighten the grip these 'money kings' now have on the country."

VOTING MACHINE MAY BE PROVIDED

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 31.—Senator Joseph of Multnomah has today introduced a bill to authorize counties or cities to purchase voting machines. No particular style of machine is designated in the bill, but it defines at length what the machine is required to do. The purchase of machines is to be optional with county courts or city councils, as the case may be.
