UNKNOWINGLY, HE BROKE GAME LAW

Owing to a faulty abstract of the game laws published on the back of hunting licenses issued in 1911, Martin L. Erickson, supervisor of the Ute national forest, on November 11, 1911, unknowingly was guilty of a game law violation by shooting ducks from a motor boat on Klamath lake. Learning recently that he had broken the law he left for Klamath Falls, appeared before a justice of the peace, plead guilty and was fined \$25, the minimum fixed by law.

Had it not been for Mr. Erickson's course recently in removing a subordinate officer of the forest service on a charge of immoral conduct, he probably never would have known that he had unwittingly violated the game laws. "To get even" the disgraced official, dug into Mr. Erickson's official career and in Erickson's service diary found an account of the duck shooting. This he reported to the district office, being able to get anything else on Mr. Erickson.

Mr. Erickson's attention was called to the matter by the district office. He visited State Game Warden Finley who stated that the law was not clear as to the Klamath lakes but had been interpreted as including them. Mr. Erickson then stated that he would appear at once before a justice of the peace and plead guilty, as he was ready to admit that he had unwittingly violated the game laws. This he did. The alleged violation occurred on November 11, 1911.

STERILIZATION BILL PASSES HOUSE

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 4.—The bill introduced by Representative Lovell providing for the rendering sterile of habitual criminals and criminal insane is today passed by the house with an overwhelming majority.

The discussion of the measure was replete with dramatic situations and during the roll call each affirmative vote was greeted with bursts of applause from members and spectators, among whom were many prominent chieftains of the state.

In brief the measure provides that the state board of health shall, upon receiving a report to the effect that any inmate of the asylums, of the penitentiary or other penal institution of the state is incurable or a chronic criminal "shall proceed to sterilize or otherwise treat such inmate as to protect and conserve society."
