The new owners announce that they will put the theatre back on its original basis—a picture house, pure and simple.

The new management state that they will dispense with all cheap vaudeville and stock companies, believing that the public wants to see photoplays in a motion picture house, and not cheap acting.

The 1913 Spray Calendar contains some changes and additions which every fruit grower should notice. This office publishes an annual spray calendar, and does not rely upon the stereotyped method of issuing a calendar good for several years.

The true pear thrips (Physothrips pyri) has not as yet put in its appearance in the Rogue river valley. After very diligent search, and the examination of a large number of specimens, none have been found.

In reading the spray calendar, be sure to read right across the page under the various headings. Every word has been put there for a purpose and, owing to space limit, very few superfluous words have been used.

HOW TO SPRAY. Use plenty of pressure, 200 pounds or more is better than lower pressure. Apply thoroughly, drenching every part of the tree. Do not try to save by economizing on spray.
