

PUT ALL FISH WORK UNDER WARDEN CLANTON

PORTLAND, Feb. 6.—To give R. E. Clanton, master fish warden of the state, full control of the propagation and distribution of trout and other game fish is the intention of Stone and other members of the state board of fish and game commissioners. To effect this will mean the making of several radical changes in the arrangement of the fish and game department during the coming year.

At present, W. L. Finley, state game warden, has charge of the game fish distribution, but in the past this arrangement has not been very successful. The trout are hatched at salmon hatcheries, which are usually busy with the propagation of the commercial fish.

If the board places this game fish work under the supervision of Mr. Clanton, a comprehensive plan will be worked out. There will first be made a thorough investigation as to which of the streams most frequently patronized by sportsmen need the fish worst. Then a series of hatcheries for the exclusive propagation of game fish is planned.

MANDOT WELCHES ON MURPHY MEET

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 6.—"Joe Mandot 'ran out' of his match with Harlem Tommy Murphy here."

This is the direct statement today of Promoter James Coffroth, following Mandot's wire from New Orleans that he could not meet Murphy here Washington's Birthday on account of a sudden attack of grippe.

"This grippe talk is all 'bunk,'" added Coffroth. "Instead of making an effort to arrive here next Monday as he promised to do, Mandot is fooling around taking on the easy ones. I sent Mandot and his manager transportation two weeks ago. It is still unclaimed. Can you beat it?"

Coffroth expects to secure an opponent for Murphy late this afternoon.

FOUR YEAR TERM FOR ALL COUNTY OFFICIALS

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 6.—Senator Farrell today introduced a resolution for amendment to the constitution to provide a four year term for all county officers in the state. His idea is that all officers, except necessary congressmen, members of the legislature and certain state officers, should be chosen in presidential years.

Then, he suggests, the people could give greater attention to initiative legislation in the "off" years without having their minds diverted by a scramble for county offices every two years. The resolution if adopted by the legislature will submit the question to the people in 1914, and the first election for four year terms under the new order of things would be in 1916.

SAN FRANCISCO TOWER TO BE TALLER THAN EIFFEL'S

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 6.—Over-topping the famed Eiffel tower in Paris by nearly 100 feet, a like structure, to be the tallest ever raised by man, is being planned for the Panama-Pacific exposition today by a group of local and eastern capitalists.

The tower will be but 1200 feet lower than Mount Tamalpais, the highest peak in this vicinity.

POLICE INSPECTORS LOSE HEADS FOR GRAFTING

NEW YORK, Feb. 6.—Police Inspector Sweeney and Captains James Hussey and James Thompson, were suspended by Police Commissioner Waldo this afternoon following a confession by Captain Thomas Walsh involving them in graft scandals. Thompson formerly was in Sweeney's inspection district.

O. A. C. HORTICULTURAL TRUST BILL INTRODUCED

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 6.—A commissioner of horticulture, backed up by a law giving him large powers in looking after nursery stock and supervising the horticultural interests of the state, is the proposal made in a bill introduced in the senate yesterday by Butler of Wasco by request of the Oregon Horticultural society. The bill appropriates \$60,000 all told for salaries and expenses. It fixes the pay of the commissioner at \$3000, his term at four years, his office at Portland, and his traveling expenses at not above \$2000. He would be appointed by a state board of horticulture, consisting of the governor, the president of the state horticultural society and the horticulturist of the state agricultural college.

The bill contains 49 sections, and forms what might be called a horticultural code for the state.

NEW YORK BARS MATCHES BETWEEN BLACKS AND WHITES

NEW YORK, Feb. 6.—Bouts between white and black pugilists are barred in this state today as the result of the latest ruling of the New York state athletic commission, which controls the glove game.

The commission has exonerated the Washington Athletic club from blame for the death of "Chick" Rose, accidentally killed in a bout here a fortnight ago.

TURKEY, STEEPED IN MISERY INDIFFERENT TO FATE OF CITY

LONDON, Feb. 6.—The London Daily Telegraph publishes an uncensored dispatch from Constantinople that the Turkish people are in such a state of misery and destitution as a result of the war that they are completely indifferent to the fate of Adrianople.

CONGRESS TO PROBE TEXAS OIL CASES

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—The house judiciary committee this afternoon approved the resolution introduced by Congressman Garner of Texas which demands that Attorney General Wickersham transmit to congress all correspondence in connection with the Texas oil cases.

Indictments were returned recently against John D. Archbold, president of the Standard Oil company and two other oil officials, by a federal grand jury in Texas which alleged violation of the Sherman anti-trust law. Warrants were also issued for the arrest of the three men but were never served, Congressman Garner alleging they were held up by orders of Wickersham.

RUBE MARQUARD STUNG ON BASEBALL WAGER

SPOKANE, Feb. 6.—After missing two baseballs thrown from the top of the old National bank building today and being unmercifully fished by the large crowd who had gathered to witness the performance, Rube Marquard, New York Giant twirler, offered any one in the crowd \$50 who could turn the trick.

W. E. Crowfoot, a photographer, accepted the challenge and caught the first ball thrown. Rube paid him the \$50 and disappeared down the street with the derisive howls of the crowd ringing in his ears.

CIVIL SERVICE RULES FOR PORTLAND TEACHERS

SALEM, Feb. 6.—The senate today passed the bill granting what amounts to civil service to the school teachers of Portland. The bill already has the approval of the house.
