BILL OFFERED TO ABOLISH TOU VELLE

The following bill to abolish the office of county judge has been introduced at Salem:

A bill for an act providing for a board of three commissioners in each county, confirming the county commissioners now in office for their respective terms, abolishing the office of county judge and providing for the appointment of a third member of the board.

Be it enacted by the people of the state of Oregon:

Section 1. The office of county judge in each county is hereby abolished.

Sec. 2. The business of each county shall be transacted by a board of county commissioners, consisting of three commissioners who shall be elected and shall qualify as now provided by the laws governing the election and qualification of county commissioners.

Sec. 3. All vacancies in the office of county commissioners shall be filled by the remaining members of the board; the appointee, however, shall hold office only until the next general election and until his successor is elected and qualified.

Sec. 4. The present county commissioners shall hold office during the respective terms for which they have been elected. The third member to fill the vacancy in the board shall be appointed as herein provided.

Sec. 5. On the first Monday of July, 1913, the present county commissioners of each county shall meet at their regular place of meeting at the county seat at ten o'clock in the forenoon and forthwith proceed to elect a third commissioner to complete the board. If the two commissioners fail to agree as to the third commissioner by the second Monday in July, 1913, the county clerk shall sit with the county commissioners and shall cast the deciding vote to fill the vacancy, and to the person so selected the county clerk shall make and deliver a certificate of appointment to fill the vacancy.

Sec. 6. County commissioners shall receive the same salaries as now provided for county commissioners in the respective counties.

Sec. 7. The laws in force, relative to the transaction of county business by county courts when this act becomes effective, except where in conflict herewith, are hereby adopted and applied to the conduct of county business by the board of county commissioners.

Sec. 8. This law shall become effective July 1st, 1913, at twelve o'clock meridian (mean time.)

EXTENDING OF TAXES IS RAPID

Much progress is being made by County Clerk Gardner in extending the county tax rolls on which his office force has been engaged during the past month. The rolls will be turned over to the sheriff February 15.

On March 1 the collection of taxes will start in the sheriff's office. A three per cent discount will be given on all taxes paid by March 15.

The company interpreted this statement as meaning them, and so walked out.

The sudden termination of the stock company's engagement threw the theatre on the hands of the new management at once. They got on the job in a hurry and by a liberal use of the wire secured a splendid attraction for tonight.

Carelessness in the phraseology of an article telling of the change in management, gave rise to the impression that Mrs. Woolworth, who has won a high place in the regard of local theatre patrons by her ability in interpreting plays on the piano, was to be allowed to go. This is entirely erroneous. The new management has the highest regard for Mrs. Woolworth as a pianist and she will have entire charge of the musical program.

A number of changes in the theatre will be made as soon as possible. It is the intention of the new management to make it the leading picture house of the city. The admission will be 10 cents and 5 cents. Never more, never less.

COUNTY TO BUILD NEW VAULT SOON

The county court in regular session Wednesday informally discussed the matter of building a new vault to hold the county recorder's records and as a result bids will be called for in the near future. The court believes it necessary to make haste in this matter as the present vault would afford little safety for the records in case of a fire.

The recorder's quarters are to be enlarged, giving him the room he needs. At present owing to cramped quarters it is difficult for a person who wishes to search a record to find a convenient place to do so a special levy was made by the court for this purpose.
