34,000 FIREMEN TO STRIKE TODAY

NEW YORK, Feb. 13.—Thirty-four thousand firemen on eastern railroads will receive orders to strike Friday unless some agreement is reached by the railroads affected and the Firemen's Brotherhood today.

The walkout will take place 48 hours after the strike orders are issued. Despite the activity of the commerce court Judge Martin A. Knapp, mediator, neither side will concede a single point.

TOLLIVER NOT GUILTY OF SLAYING LEWIS

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Feb. 13.—"Not guilty," was the verdict today in the case of Hubert G. Tolliver, accused of murdering G. Lewis, the shipboard inventor last May.

The jury did not leave the box. Lewis admitted killing Tolliver, but declared he was driven insane by wrongs inflicted by them upon his wife.

WALSH VICTIM OF LATEST POISON PLOT

NEW YORK, Feb. 13.—A plot to poison Police Captain Walsh whose confession is alleged to have involved a number of high police officials in New York's police graft scandal, was reported today. District Attorney Whitman ordered a nurse and a doctor to inspect all food prepared for Walsh. A heavy guard also was thrown about his residence.

DIAZ TROOPS TO RESIST INVASION

EL PASO, Feb. 13.—To aid the garrison at Juarez to resist a possible American invasion the mobilizing of all Diaz troops in Northern Chihuahua has been ordered according to Diaz leaders here today. They declare the Juarez garrison has declared for Diaz despite denials on the part of its commander, Col. Vasquez. There are three thousand rebels in the Juarez district.

Refugees reaching here today from Ciudad Juarez declare there is great disorder there and hundreds of Americans are endangered. When the refugees left the city was in control of a number of about 1000 drunken Mexicans. Three thousand troops garrisoned there refused to fire on the mob, it is reported. According to unconfirmed reports Governor Gonzalez has fled from the city.

WOLGAST TO RETURN FOR LENGTHY STAY

Ad Wolgast, former lightweight champion of the world, passed through Medford this afternoon on his way to San Francisco where he is to meet Harlem Tommy Murphy soon. Ad stated that he regretted that he was unable to stop over at present but that he would do so in the near future and spend considerable time in the valley.

On their first eastern trip the Chicago Cubs will play an exhibition game at Syracuse, N. Y., the proceeds to be given to Mrs. Doyle, widow of the former third baseman of the Chicago team.

DOUGLAS ALARMED OVER AMERICANS

DOUGLAS, Ariz., Feb. 13.—Alarm is felt here today for the safety of American citizens in the state of Sonora, Mexico. The situation is becoming more delicate daily, and while the federal officers are giving out telegrams purporting to come from President Madero, relayed through the governor's office, saying "all quiet at the capital; country tranquil; Diaz be overthrown in a few hours," the garrisons in the larger towns are openly disaffected.

Prominent Mexicans have commenced, more or less guardedly, to announce their favor of Diaz and an open revolt would not surprise anyone.

Four troops of the Ninth United States cavalry, which has been patrolling the border west of here, received orders to return immediately to Douglas, where the rest of the regiment is now mobilized. Their places will be taken by the Fifth cavalry, ten troops of which are now located at Fort Huachuca, Arizona.

WAR NEWS UPSETS TODAY'S STOCK MARKET

NEW YORK, Feb. 13.—The stock market closed firm today. The preparations to export \$1,000,000 more gold, draining more than \$5,000,000 from the local sub-treasury, caused great uneasiness in money circles. The Mexican revolution and the threatened strike of firemen on eastern railroads caused an unsettled day throughout.

Canadian Pacific dropped three

points while the general railroad list was heavy. Reading lost 2 1/2 and Smelting 2 points. The sentiment was bearish throughout.
