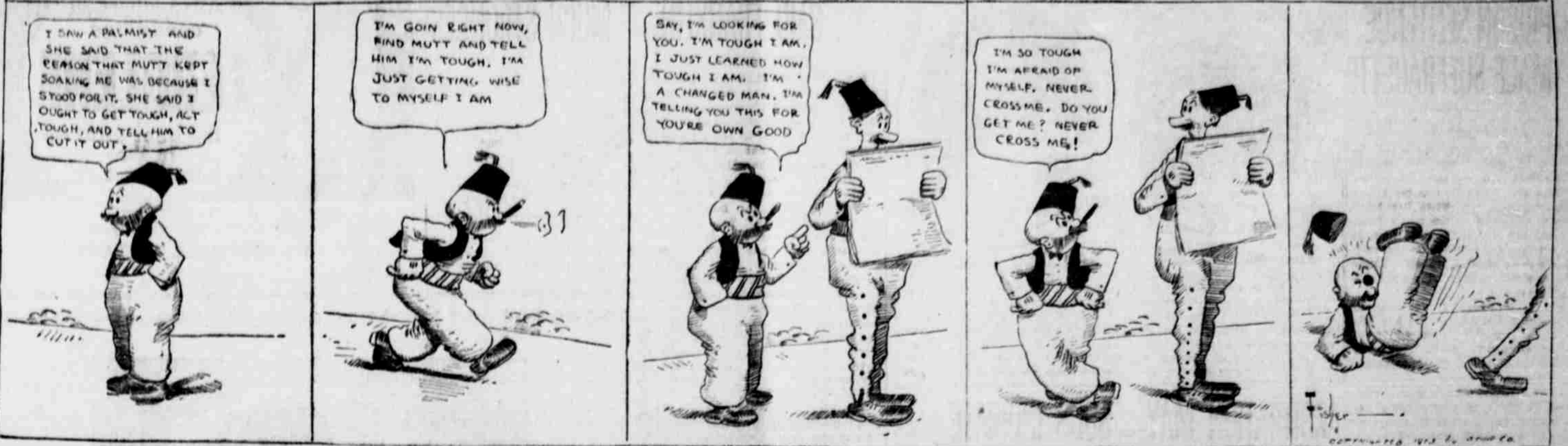


Mutt Crossed and Spoiled Everything

CIVIL SUIT AGAINST CASH REGISTER CO.

CINCINNATI, Ohio, Feb. 18.—United States District Attorney McPherson today went to Washington to confer with Attorney General Wickersham regarding the civil suit pending against the National Cash Register company. More than a score of the company's officials were sentenced to various terms of imprisonment yesterday for criminal violations of the Sherman anti-trust law. It was reported the civil suit may be dropped.
