

TWO MONTHS IN PRISON SENTENCE MALE SUFFRAGETTE

LONDON, Feb. 18.—Two months in prison at hard labor was the sentence imposed today on William Landebury, a "male suffragette," and son of a laborite member of parliament, and Miss Sylvia Pankhurst, daughter of Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, and Miss Cecelia Emerson, an American suffragette, for the malicious destruction of property. Landebury smashed the windows of Bromley town hall.

"I don't care, I don't care," shouted Landebury as he left the dock. "I will continue to break windows until the government recognizes the rights of the poor and of the women."

Annie Landebury William Landebury's sister, and two other suffragettes who refused to give their names were each sentenced to one month's imprisonment. None of those sentenced today was given the opportunity of paying a fine.

During the progress of the hearing, militant suffragettes in the courtroom shouted:

"Keep the flag flying," and "votes for women!"

GOOD ROADS BILL RESCUED

bonds and left entirely to the county court the sole right to say for the first time after election where the roads were to be built by the money raised by the bond issue and the amounts to be expended on each. This bill was sent to the house and the house refused to consider the same.

An attempt on the part of the leading members of both house and senate to cause a harmony committee to be appointed from the house and senate to rewrite the bills and effect a compromise, carried the senate but was defeated in the house; then the roads committee of both houses got together and reported back to the house a new bill called the Barrett-Hard bill; this bill was a compromise between the two measures and provided that the petitioners should in the petition fix the location of the road, the amount to be expended on it and all other similar details; this compromise passed the house but the senate rejected it by an overwhelming vote.

Conferees Appointed

At this stage the senate appointed Senators Burgess, Parrell and Butler and the house appointed Reames, Upton and Forbes as a conference committee; the committee after wrestling with the question all Friday night came to an agreement but was then confronted with the plain illegality of the entire proceeding; the bill last passed by the house was not the Barrett bill as it passed the senate and the house still had the Barrett bill in its possession and the senate had the Hurd bill; to pass the compromise bill would put the legislature in the position of passing a bill which reality would only have passed one house.

The best parliamentarians of both house and senate well called into the conference and a plan was agreed upon which in order to be put into effect would require practically the unanimous consent of both houses. Following late session Saturday night, and with the hands of the clock stopped at midnight Chairman Reames of the conference committee secured the floor and explained to the house the legal difficulty confronting both house and senate and the utter impossibility of introducing a new measure at so late a time; he urged the co-operation of every member to assist in unraveling the tangle and outlined the following plan:

Reames Outlines Plan

1. The house must by unanimous consent recede from its former action in attempting to amend the original Barrett bill by the substitution of another.

2. With the deck thus cleared the house should then receive the conference report and the same should be on roll call accepted under suspension of the rules by a two-thirds vote.

3. The rules should again be suspended by a two-thirds vote, the original Barrett bill as it passed the senate should be called from the table considered and printed and engrossed as amended by the conference report and placed upon its final passage in the house.

4. The bill as amended should then be read in full and passed. Then it should be sent to the senate and that body should concur.

Only One Objection

Only one member objected to the plan, Hill of Polk claiming that it was too late to consider such an important measure and that action should be deferred until Monday. The plan of procedure reported by the conference committee was then adopted and carried through. Upon final

ARBITRATION MAY END PHONE STRIKE

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Feb. 18.—Despite considerable strike talk which is being received from Portland, with regard to the negotiations which have been in progress for some time between officials of the Pacific district council of electrical workers and the Pacific Telephone company local representatives of the electrical workers are still confident that the matter will be adjusted by arbitration. A conference will be held this Tuesday afternoon between representatives of the corporation and of the workers and if an agreement is not reached a strike of the entire Pacific coast may result.

The employees of the above corporation are asking for a wage increase of fifty cents per day and a change in working conditions.

This involves the linemen, cable-splitters, switchboard men, troublemen, repairmen, testboardmen, repeatermen, facility men, inspectors and all other employees in the operating, maintenance and construction departments. The request for the proposed increase was presented to the company in December and since that time the matter has been dealt with in conference on several occasions. The assumed position of the company that conditions would not permit of this added operating expense terminated in an offer from the corporation to continue the present wages and conditions. This offer was submitted to the electrical workers of forty-one locals of Washington, Oregon, California, Idaho and Nevada. The result of the vote which has been made known to the members, shows that the men are united in the above demands.

When the bill was finally declared passed, all sides and factions of the road enthusiasts and opponents voting for it nearly every member left his seat and congratulated the representative from Jackson county in bringing order out of chaos and snatching victory from defeat at the eleventh hour; the clock still said midnight but it was probably nearer morning when the message from the house informed the senate (still in session) of the action taken.

But little infection is found in the orchards. Most of them are clean. Here and there a case of hold-over blight is found, but not many. The inspectors say that three years ago there was more blight in any one out of many orchards than there is now in the entire valley.

DARROW HONEST SAID FRANKLIN

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Feb. 18.—Two witnesses to swear that Bert H. Franklin declared Clarence Darrow to be honest and upright, and innocent of any attempt to bribe jurors through him were put on the stand by the Darrow defense today when the trial of the former chief counsel for the McNamaras was resumed. They were Frank E. Dominguez, legal associate of Earl Rogers, Gordon G. Watt, secretary of the Montana state senate and former city clerk of Venice, Cal.

"Franklin told me," Dominguez testified "that Darrow had nothing to do with the bribery of jurors in the McNamara trial, and that Darrow was the best friend he ever had, and would never stand for corruption or dirty work of any kind. He said that Darrow was of the highest integrity and above reproach."

Following Dominguez on the witness stand, Watt testified that Franklin told him, in the presence of other persons that Darrow never gave him money for any bribe.

"He told me," Watt said, "that the district attorney was holding the Lockwood bribery over his head to compel him to testify against Darrow."
