Send Texas Troops Home Four companies of Texas troops sent to Brownsville, Texas, will be returned to their respective posts. Advice say the situation at Matamoros, Mexico, is exaggerated. It is claimed that in any event the American regulars would prevent the militia from invading Mexico.

Governor Colquitt of Texas is advised today that the Americans at Matamoros are not endangered. General David De La Fuente, Gomez chief of staff is here, en route to Mexico City. If Huerta accepts the peace terms De La Fuente has been authorized to offer Gomez a place in the cabinet.

INCOME TAX IS NOW IN EFFECT

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25.—The income tax amendment went into effect at noon today in a formal proclamation issued by Secretary of State Knox. This is the first constitutional amendment enacted since the abolition of slavery.

NEBRASKA MILITIA ORDERED TO RECRUIT

OMAHA, Neb., Feb. 25.—Orders were received here today by the Nebraska militia to recruit itself at once to its full strength. Adjutant General Hall of Lincoln then announced he had arranged to convert the state fair grounds at Lincoln into a camping ground for mobilization of the militia. It was reported the Third Nebraska infantry has been ordered to be equipped for immediate service.

GOVERNMENT TO IGNORE CALIFORNIA

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Feb. 25.—The government's plan for the dissolution of the Union Pacific-Southern Pacific merger will not be affected by the order of the California railroad commission in denying the application of the Union Pacific railway for a 999-year lease of the Benicia cut-off between Oakland, Cal., and Sacramento according to Attorney General Wickersham, who is here on government business.

LOS ANGELES RAIN BREAKS ALL RECORDS

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Feb. 25.—With a registered rainfall of 6.65 inches for the storm. Los Angeles is drenched today, and indications point to more rain today and tonight. The heavy and continuous downpour has broken all records for Los Angeles, about forty per cent of a season's normal rainfall having fallen in thirty-six hours. Considerable damage to property is reported. The storm was general throughout Southern California.

MEXICANS UNITE TO RESIST INVASION

DOUGLAS, Ariz., Feb. 25.—As the result of a mass meeting attended by almost every Mexican citizen at Agua Prieta, Sonora, political differences will be forgotten to permit a united front against a common enemy in the event of American intervention, according to news of the meeting which is leaking out today.

MADERO'S WIDOW SAILS FOR HAVANA

VERA CRUZ, Mexico, Feb. 25.—Senoras Madero and Suarez, widows of former president Francisco I. Madero and former vice president, Suarez, arrived here today to sail for Havana on the Cuban Gunboat Cuba. They were accompanied by Manuel Sterlin, the Cuban minister. Senora Madero and her five children were re-united on the quai.

(Continued from page 1.) Diaz and a result the city is quiet and conditions are reported improved in all sections of the republic.

The acceptance by American Ambassador Wilson of the government's version of the killing of Madero and Suarez has relieved Americans and other foreign residents. They considered it a discreet move by Wilson not to assist in any popular agitation.

Despite Huerta's repressive measures, some slight deflection was reported today in the federal garrison here. It was not of a serious nature, however, and the government officials have the situation well in hand.

A dispatch received here today reported that Boris Carow, an American engineer, was slain in a rebel attack Saturday on the town of Nuevo Bueno Vista. Several British and German employes of a mining company also are reported missing.

(Continued from page 1.) legal presentation of them to the governor. Malarkey and Cochran climbed along a narrow ledge to a window opening into the governor's office and after gaining access, deposited their senate bills on his desk.

This action was taken after the senate yesterday adopted a resolution in which the continued absence of the governor was set forth, and authorizing the president and chief clerk to force an entrance to the executive chamber to file such senate bills as has been passed. The house passed a similar resolution.

After Malarkey and Cochran had forced an entrance to the executive offices, a door was opened and Chief Clerk Drager of the house brought in fifty-three bills which had been passed by both houses.

Chief Clerk Fitzgerald of the judiciary committee of the senate; W. P. Lord, an attorney, and R. E. Smith of Roseburg were appointed guards to watch over the bills until the governor arrived.

"I may go away again tomorrow, if I choose—and if I do, there will be none of the roughnecks around here breaking in my door to present bills in my absence," remarked Governor West. He has been taking a brief vacation at Seaside.

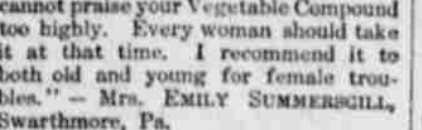
SUPERIOR COURT BILL IS PASSED

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 25.—The senate has passed the house bill abolishing the office of district attorney and creating that of county attorney. The amended superior court bill has passed the senate. Eight judges are added to the present number. One feature of the bill provides that the duties of county judges relative to probate and judicial matters are to be transferred to the circuit judges and the county judges are left with the business administration of county affairs only.

ROAD LEVY FAILS OVER LISTER'S VETO

OLYMPIA, Wash., Feb. 25.—The house of representatives today passed over the veto of Governor Lister, the Cheney normal bill and then attempted to press its advantage and also pass over his veto the mill and a half public highway levy. The vote on the normal bill was 77 to 10. But when the road levy bill was taken up immediately afterward there were defections right and left on the rollcall. By a vote of 60 to 34 the house failed to pass the bill over the governor's veto.
