

APPROPRIATION BILL PASSED OVER VETO OF GOVERNOR WEST

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 26.—The legislature has today passed the general appropriation bill, carrying more than a million dollars, over the veto of Governor West, Carlin and Westerland voting to override the veto, Reames to sustain it.

This measure provides for salaries and expenses of all the state officials and departments, including the legislature and its attaches. It carries appropriations which aggregate nearly \$1,250,000.

In addition to salaries and expenses of state officials and departments, there are included such items—which also would be affected by the emergency clause—as \$25,000 for election pamphlets, \$50,000 for immigration work, \$40,000 for bounties on wild animals, \$24,000 for naval militia, \$25,000 for the Portage railway, \$12,000 for the state board of horticulture and a number of smaller ones of like nature.

The governor gave as his reason that the bill, which has an emergency clause attached, carries a number of items for which no emergency exists and that he doesn't approve of including them in any measure with an emergency clause. He stated he did not believe in taking away from the people the right to pass on such appropriations if they so desire. He also objected to having his right to pass on them independently from the necessary appropriations for the maintenance of the various departments of the state government abridged in such a manner.

"Good business and the best interests of the taxpayers of this state demand that such appropriations are covered by this bill be classified and presented in smaller units," says the governor in his veto message. "I know of no greater service that you can render to your state than that of presenting these appropriations in the manner here suggested and thereby set an example for future legislators."

SALARIES PROVIDED COUNTY ATTORNEYS

SALEM, Feb. 26.—The new county attorney bill continues present district attorneys in office, each in the county of his residence. In each county in which no district attorney now resides the governor is to appoint until the next election in 1916. The salaries provided are as follows: Baker and Umatilla counties, \$2,400 each; Clackamas, Douglas, Jackson, Lane, Malheur, Marion, Linn and Washington counties, \$2,100 each; Clatsop, Coos, Lake, Klamath, Union and Wasco counties, \$1,800 each; Crook, Harney and Grant counties, \$1,500 each; Benton, Columbia, Hood River, Josephine, Morrow, Tillamook and Yamhill counties \$1,200 each; Gilliam, Sherman, Wallowa and Wheeler counties, \$1,000 each; Polk county, \$900; Curry and Lincoln counties, \$600 each; Multnomah county, \$400, with one deputy at \$240, three deputies at \$180 and three deputies at \$120.
