STRIFE ENDS IN FISH COMMISSION

SALEM, Or., Feb. 28.—The inter- nal strife in the state fish and game commission has ended. A conclusion to bury the hatchet and smoke the pipe of peace was reached yesterday when the full membership of the commission was in session. There will be no changes either as to wardens or the field of their labors.

For some time there has been strife between State Game Warden W. L. Finley and Master Fish Warden R. E. Clanton. In this controversy members of the commission had also taken sides. It is asserted now that this trouble has all been settled.

Much of the cause of dissention was over the desire of the fish warden to have full control over the fish. The game warden also has charge of planting the fish. The fish warden superintends the hatcheries, but when the fish are ready to be liberated in the streams then the authority falls to the game warden, and he sees to this portion of the work. The commission decided to make no change in this arrangement.

PORTLAND VOTES ON COMMISSION FIRMS

PORTLAND, Or., Feb. 28.—The city council today ordered a special election for May 3 to vote on whether a commission form of government for Portland shall be adopted.

If approved by the people, the au- thority and duties now vested in 49 or 50 city officials will be centered in five elected commissioners, including the mayor, whose authority and re- sponsibility shall be well defined and directly applied.

KERN TO BE LEADER OF SENATE DEMOCRATS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—An- nounced that he would not seek the leadership of the democratic majority in the coming session of the senate was made here this afternoon by Senator Thomas S. Martin of Vir- ginia. This practically assures the selection of Senator Kern of Indiana as leader.
