THE O. A. C. PROGRAM.

THAT another referendum will be invoked upon the University of Oregon appropriation bill is the assertion of H. J. Parkison, who led the fight against the appropriation two years ago, and who succeeded in materially crippling that institution by means of fraudulent petitions.

The bills which it is proposed to send to the referendum from among the appropriations for the university, are those providing for \$75,000 for sundry improvements, \$100,000 for an administration building and \$12,833 for improvement purposes.

Parkison declared that the bill providing for consolidation of the university with the Oregon Agricultural College will be placed on the ballot at the earliest moment and that the referendum on the buildings and improvements appropriations, but not on the maintenance appropriations, has a direct bearing on a consolidation move.

The total aggregate of the appropriations for the university is \$317,833 and for the Agricultural college \$605,500. Parkison says that no referendum will be placed to the Oregon Agricultural College appropriation bills, either for betterments or improvements, as it is part of the scheme to allow the university to be maintained and the agricultural college to develop. He is quoted as saying:

"There is a strong sentiment to abolish the university and have the college at Corvallis add such studies as conditions and the public demand and also to take the question of support for the school out of the hands of the legislature by providing a proper direct millage tax."

Here we have in clear outline the ultimate aim of the controlling powers of the O. A. C. as expressed by their political agent that does the dirty work. The program is: First, systematic starving of the university by referendum by fair means or foul, its appropriations and thus preventing its growth and development; though permitting a dwarfed existence.

Second, the forced and unnatural growth and development, by inflation, swollen appropriations and padded enrollments of the Agricultural College; the duplication on a cheap scale, of university departments, and the gradual absorption of the vital and popular branches of university work.

Third, the final obitoin of the university and the further aggrandizement and enlargement of the Oregon Agricultural College as the sole state institution, for the O. A. C. favors consolidation through swallowing its rival.

When this shall have been accomplished, the O. A. C. favors the millage plan of support to take it out of politics, when it has no longer need to play politics. Until then the O. A. C. will oppose the millage plan, and if it is forced will come in for special appropriations just as the state normal is doing.

What is the university going to do about it? It is alright to say public sympathy is with the university and sit down and wait for indication, but it reminds one of the hunger strike of the suffragettes—rather hard on the subject.

Praise for Reames at Salem

(Salem Capital Journal.) There has been much quiet talk around the legislative halls that if Governor West adheres to his repeatedly expressed determination to retire from politics at the end of his term, his influence and support will go toward making Clarence L. Reames, the representative in the house from the Joint Jackson-Douglas district, his successor.

The Medford lawyer has repeatedly shown himself to be one of the ablest and strongest members of the house, despite the fact that he is one of a hopeless little minority in that body. He is a hard fighter, and yet fights straight and parliamentary, and without indulging in personal filings. And, above all, he possesses a keen sense of humor and fairness. Reames, despite his politics, is one of the popular members of the legislature. He has come to the front strong the past two weeks.

He is a close personal and political friend of Governor West, and has exerted, perhaps, the widest influence in obtaining for the governor what few crumbs of joy and comfort the

latter has obtained from the legislature.

Leaders of the Democratic party of Oregon have been keeping a close eye on the legislature, and its few Democratic members, both for campaign material and possible candidates for governor. Gossip has it that Reames looks to them like splendid gubernatorial timber, and puts him ahead of J. K. Howard, the Douglas county representative, who, it is argued, would be handicapped as a possible candidate for governor by the fact that he is a minister.

Howard, like Reames, is one of the able and popular members of the house. The Glendale preacher is, in addition to being pastor of a Presbyterian church, a banker and a business man. He has been very active and fearless in legislative affairs, and so broad and fair is he that he possesses the confidence and respect of every faction and clique in the house—a somewhat remarkable fact, considering the prejudice in many circles against a minister in politics. Howard is also a splendid orator, and, like Reames, would make things hum in a campaign.

MOTORCYCLE COPS 13 ARE LOCKED TO WATCH SPEEDERS IN CITY BASTILE

Chief Hittson of the Medford police force today announced that he had appointed a motorcycle cop to trail speeding autos in the city and bring them to time. The new officer will go on duty at once.

The identity of the new cop is not disclosed in order that he may follow autos without the drivers knowing of it. His cycle is equipped with a standard speedometer, which will support testimony regarding speed.

"Speeding in the city is not as prevalent as it was," stated the chief today, "but once in awhile chronic speeders touch it up a bit. This has got to stop."

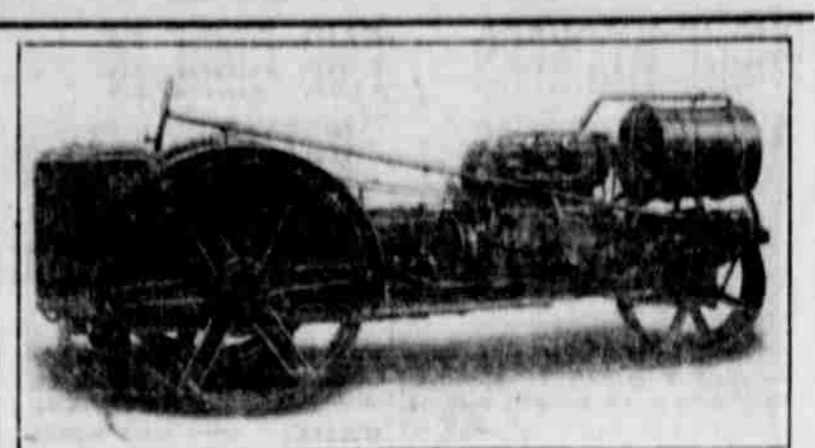
