

WHAT LEGISLATURE COST TAXPAYERS OF OLD OREGON

SALEM, Or., Feb. 28.—Appropriations aggregating nearly \$6,000,000 were passed by the twenty-seventh Oregon legislature. This is but little more than half the amount for which requests were made. This amount does not include the many salary raises that were passed, nor the large continuing appropriations, such as the support for educational institutions, heretofore made. ANGLERS CENSURE WESTERLUND'S AND CARKIN'S ATTITUDE

At a meeting of the Rogue River Fish Protective association held Thursday evening at the library hall, resolutions deploring the attitude of Representatives Westerlund and Carkin in subordinating the fish bill to the armory were passed and the representatives censured for not giving Representative Reames hearty support. The armory project does not meet with the enthusiastic support of the fishermen.

It was decided to continue the work of circulating petitions to the governor asking for a veto on the fish bill and to invoke the referendum provided the measure was passed over the veto by the legislature next week. The matter of cooperation with the state game commission for stricter enforcement of fishing laws next season was discussed and a fund will be raised to prosecute delinquents. Word was received from Rod Macleay, representing the lower river interests, that he would meet the local anglers Saturday and discuss the situation as well as tell of the legislative struggle. A meeting of the association will be called to meet him Saturday evening.

UNION REVIVAL SERVICE HELD AT JACKSONVILLE

The union revival services at Jacksonville, conducted by Capt. C. O. Branson's wife, are gaining in interest every day. Last Sunday 32 young people of the M. E. 7 AMENDMENTS TO BE VOTED UPON

SALEM, Or., Feb. 28.—According to the joint resolutions today on file in the office of the secretary of state, there will be seven amendments to be voted on by the people in 1914. They are:

Providing that only fully naturalized aliens may vote; allowing indebtedness to be incurred for reclamation of arid lands; creating the office of lieutenant governor; relating to powers of assessment and taxation; providing for uniform rules of assessment and taxation; providing for methods whereby cities and towns may be merged into adjoining cities and towns, and to allow the city of Portland and Multnomah county to be merged under one government.

Clean hair brushes with GOLD DUST

To clean hair brushes without injury, have ready two basins, one three-fourths full of boiling water and the other with the same amount of cold water.
