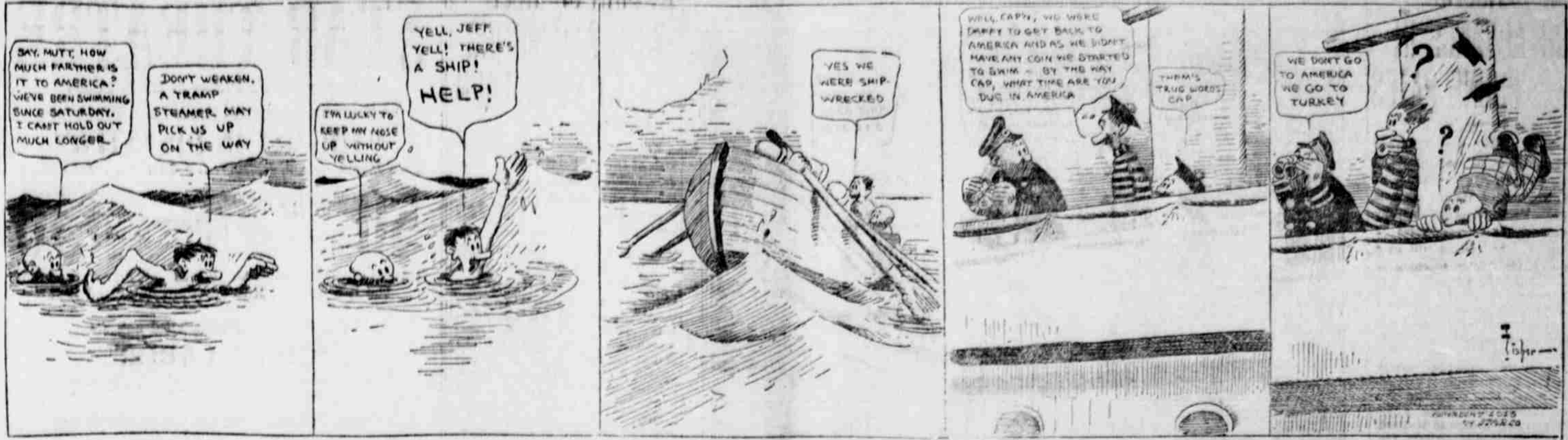


And Now Mutt and Jeff Are Right Where They Started
