ROGUE RIVER FISH BILL.

DESPITE the gallant fight made by Representative Reames and Governor West's veto, the bill reopening the Rogne river to commercial fishing has been cuacted into a law by the legislature to go into effect June 5th, next.

Though defeated upon one contention, the result is therwise a victory. The stand taken by the Rogue River Fish Protective association and by Representative Reames is justified by results. The people at the mouth of the river are entitled to fish for salmon. The stream is wide and for 30 'years salmon fishing has been the main resource of this isolated section. A large cannery was idle and a valuable food product that brought in a quarter of a million dollars annually to the state, was going to waste. A real hardship was worked upon several hundred families.

The closed stream law was passed because the Hume interests, then controlling the cannery, not content with

salmon, went after steelhead, and refused consideration that he might become a member to the people of Jackson county. 

A brief summary of the fish law shows how well the steelhead and trout are protected by the bill:

Steelhead are classified as trout, and it is made at all times unlawful to eatch, except by hook and line, or to regular meeting on March 18, 1913 purchase, sell or transport for sale any trout caught by for a license to sell spirituous, vision any means in the Rogue or any of its tributaries.

Salmon fishing is permitted below the Illinois month, than a gallon at his place of business from May 15 to August 10 and from September 1 to November 1, and from Grants Pass to Jump-off Joe creek, from June 1 to July 31. Nets are restricted to 81/2 inch mesh, through which steelhead can easily pass, and only drift nets can be used at Grants Pass during the open season. If steelhead or trout are entangled, they must be returned to the river.
