Von der Hellen, credit for being the shrewdest political worker in the city and being the most indomitable worker, for there were very few but what he visited and used all of his persuasive powers on to convert them to his views, using different tactics, as the case required. Yes, we are beaten in the case, but not discouraged, for we believe that, having the experience of Ashland, Medford, Jacksonville, Gold Hill, etc. before us as examples of recklessness going in debt that the people of Eagle Point will soon call a halt, for this means a prospective indebtedness of at least \$16,000 and another bond issue in the near future for a water system of at least \$10,000 more, with only about \$175,000 worth of taxable property in the limits of the incorporation.
