HOME BURNS ON TRAIL CREEK

Mrs. Higgins with two children were absent from home when the fire occurred, visiting friends at Ashland. Mr. Higgins came in from the field in the evening and set about preparing his evening meal. He used oil in starting the fire and the fire got beyond control. He was slightly burned about the hands while attempting to combat the flames.

The loss is approximately \$2000, the house being a new one. No insurance was carried.

COUNTY COURT TO MEET ASHLANDERS

Within the next few days the county court is to meet with citizens of Ashland and discuss with them the matter of collecting the general road levy, from which Ashland citizens believe themselves to be exempt owing to a clause in their charter. Ashlanders threaten an injunction suit to stop the collection of the general road tax.

The county court will meet with the Ashland citizens and attorneys and look into the matter. It is probable that the case will be carried through the courts in order to positively decide the question.

The charter of the city of Ashland contains a clause exempting property in that city from paying a county road tax. This is believed to be unconstitutional.

LE MASTERS FREE; WEST PARDONS

T. A. Le Master, serving a sentence in the county jail for bigamy was released today following the receipt of a pardon from Governor West. The extension of clemency followed the statement of physicians that Le Master was threatened with quick consumption and that confinement in the county jail would result in his death.

By the terms of the pardon Le Master must report twice a week to Circuit Judge Calkins either in person or by letter.

Le Master plead guilty to a charge of bigamy a short time ago. He married a second time believing that he had been divorced for seven years. He was believed technically but not morally guilty.

CITY ENFORCING ELECTRICAL CODE

In accord with his announced intention of enforcing all of the ordinances in the city, Mayor Elfert, aside from strictly enforcing the speed and curfew ordinances, has ordered a strict investigation of all public buildings for their electrical wiring and many repairs have been ordered by Deputy Inspector Hinman, who is in direct charge of the work.

A large number of business houses have been overhauled and repairs ordered. The electrical men in the city have their hands full tearing out old work and putting in new. All of the work is being put in in accord with the national electrical code.

YOUTH BRUTALLY ASSAULTS GIRLS

What is said to be one of the most brutal assaults on a woman in the history of Jackson county will be aired this afternoon in the court of Justice of the Peace Glenn O. Taylor, when Charles Aitken, a 17 year old boy of Rogue River is arraigned on two charges, one for criminal assault and the other for a statutory crime.

Young Aitken is said to have attacked two girls, one 12 years old and the other 18. The attacks were made at different times. The first is said to have been committed when Aitken met the 12 year old girl on the outskirts of town, dragged her from a horse she was riding, tied her to a tree and ravished her.

Threats are said to have sealed her lips until her sister was later attacked. The older girl escaped.

from the youth after her clothes had nearly all been torn from her and she had been badly bruised. Aitken was arrested by Sam L.
