FEDERALS FEAR INSURRECTO TRAP

DOUGLAS, Ariz., March 11.—Failure of General Ojeda and his federal troops to leave Agua Prieta for Nogales according to plans outlined late yesterday is attributed today to information brought to him of a rebel strategy to catch his command between two forces and annihilate it. This also would explain the failure of the superior force of rebels encamped near Agua Prieta to attack that post. The attack, momentarily expected for three days, has not materialized, and it is believed here that the rebel commander, working in conjunction with Calles, Lopez and other rebel chieftains who are said to be merging their forces between here and Nogales, really wished Ojeda to start his march, permitting the execution of the coup. Ojeda today made arrangements for the transfer to Douglas hospital of several wounded soldiers of the El Tigre and Nacozari garrisons, brought here when the federals fled from those towns following their defeat unday and Monday.

DOCUMENTARY EVIDENCE IN ALASKAN FRAUDS

CHICAGO, March 11.—Efforts were made here today to prevent the introduction of documentary proofs that false entries were filed on government lands in Alaska, in the suit against Albert C. Frost of this city, who with several others is accused of defrauding the government out of \$16,000,000 in land and coal holdings in the far north. The defense argued that this evidence was inadmissible because the filings were made by individuals and were not intended as links in a defrauding conspiracy. DESCENDANTS OF GREAT NAPOLEON LIVE ON COAST

SAN FRANCISCO, March 11.—Children of John Gordon, reputed son of Napoleon Bonaparte, are living quietly with their identity not generally known in Los Angeles, Oakland, San Francisco and New London, Conn., according to representations made here today by Mrs. Susan DeLaney of Oakland, one of Gordon's children. The body of Gordon, whom Mrs. DeLaney says was Napoleon's youngest son and issue of the beautiful Princess Louise, reposes in a plot at Laurel Hill cemetery here. According to the story told by Mrs. DeLaney, the noble-blooded infant with which Princess Louise escaped from the St. Helena fire was adopted by William Gordon, a wealthy London jeweler. Princess Louise, it was said, never saw the child again. William Gordon taught his foster son the jeweler's craft, Mrs. DeLaney said. John Gordon finally locating in New London, Conn. There he married a Miss Jones, the following children resulting from the marriage: William Gordon of 738 1/2 San Pedro street, Los Angeles; Mrs. Susan DeLaney of 586 Sycamore street, Oakland; Mrs. Annie Nickerson of San Francisco, and Mrs. Martha Champion of New London. Mrs. DeLaney says that Gordon informed her of his royal parentage but wanted it kept a secret. She must reveal it to her eldest daughter and then only on her deathbed. Mrs. DeLaney is the eldest daughter. "My mother on her deathbed," said Mrs. DeLaney today, "told me of our relationship with Napoleon. 'Here is what she told me: 'Your father was the youngest son of Napoleon. His mother was the Princess Louise. The princess was infatuated with Napoleon. She followed him to St. Helena when he was exiled in 1815. Some time later a son was born to them. That son was John Gordon, your father.'"

SEEK NATIONAL MINIMUM WAGE LAW FOR WOMEN

WASHINGTON, March 11.—Surrendered to action by the revelations uncovered in the "starvation wages" probe in Chicago, appeals for immediate consideration of a minimum wage law for women poured in here today on members of congress. The pleas came from nearly every state in the union and as a result it was predicted that the wage problem would be considered at the regular session of congress next December. Congressman Peters of Massachusetts has interested himself in the movement. "The testimony in Chicago," he said, "shows exactly what anyone studying the subject knows—that a girl getting from \$4 to \$5 weekly must ask favors outside to support herself. I favor a minimum law and believe the bedrock of that law should not be below \$6 weekly."
