SOLON TRADED PARTY FOR \$50,000 BRIDGE

OLYMPIA, Wash., March 11.—Representative Jens Jensen of Pen d'Oreille, the only progressive who voted against the initiative on constitutional amendments, is today branded a traitor to the progressive party and has been read out of the party by the bullmoose members of the house. The latter addressed an open letter to the progressive state committee charging Jensen with having sold out to the house machine for a \$50,000 bridge over the Pen d'Oreille river. Affidavits by Representatives Running and Palkner charge Jensen's confession of this trade. Jensen was elected in the by-election to succeed S. J. Appleman, Republican, deceased. He has been consistently voting against the progressives.

CHICAGO, March 11.—Claiming that he lost 16 pounds during his recent attack of pneumonia, and he was near the "dead line" for two days, Jack Johnson, the negro prize fighter, is on the streets again here today. KING MAY BECOME LAND COMMISSIONER

WASHINGTON, March 11.—Judge Will R. King, national committeeman from Oregon, may be appointed commissioner of the general land office. A vigorous western committeeman is endorsing him. Asked about it, King said: "I have not given the matter any thought and cannot say whether I would like that appointment."

PROTECTING THE BIRDS.

A most meritorious provision of the new game code is that providing protection for non-game birds—which are of far greater economic importance to the country than the game birds.

Sec. 7 of the new code provides:

No person shall, within the state of Oregon, hunt for, kill or take or have in his or her possession, living or dead, any wild bird, other than game bird, or non-game birds not protected by law, or purchase or offer or expose for sale, transport or ship within or without the state, any such wild birds after it has been killed or caught, except as permitted by this act. No part of the plumage of birds protected by this section shall be sold or offered for sale or had in possession except for scientific purposes.

Non-game birds not protected are: hawks, owls, English sparrows, shrikes, cormorants, merganser ducks, crows and ravens, magpies and blue jays. Sec. 9 provides:

Any person who shall, within the state of Oregon, take or needlessly destroy, sell or offer for sale, the nest or the eggs of any wild bird, except non-game birds not protected by law, or who shall have such nest or eggs in his or her possession, except for scientific purposes, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punished as hereinafter provided.

Gradually the nation is realizing the necessity for stringent laws to prevent the extermination of birds and the consequent loss to crops. Feathered creatures have at last the protection by law in Oregon that they are entitled to, and there is every reason to believe that they will soon have in the nation as a national-law has been introduced at Washington.

Delay in protection for birds has already cost the nation dearly. We are paying out thousands of dollars for protection of horticulturists and agriculturists against pests that the birds would have taken care of had we taken care of the birds.

Bugs, worms, caterpillars, moths, and creeping and flying pests stole \$420,000,000 from the farmers of the United States last year. Had the country had the normal supply or even the same proportion of birds that it had half a century ago, it would have meant a saving of \$250,000,000.

Birds may take a little grain or a little fruit, but they earn all they take and much more by the havoc they work among insects, and with weed seeds. Insects form 73 per cent of the diet of meadow larks, 40 per cent of the food of robins, 83 per cent of the orioles diet, and 74 per cent of the woodpeckers food.

A pair of rose-breasted grosbeaks has been known to feed over 7,000 potato bugs in one day to its young. In the crop of one dove 9,200 seeds of weeds injurious to crops, were found.

Thirty-eight species of birds eat the boll weevil, which destroys \$20,000,000 of cotton in a year. Many other crop losses running into the millions could be cited which would be materially diminished by the birds.

Birds, their story, their life, and their utility and necessity should be taught in the public schools—a far more useful subject than fairy tales.

AN INDEFENSIBLE CLAUSE.

IN commenting upon the passage of the Rogue River fish bill, the Portland Oregonian says:

Doubtless Mr. Reames finds it necessary to explain how it all happened. Mr. Reames is an energetic and resourceful man, but it obvious that his close alliance with Governor West wrought great mischief to his cause. As it is, Messrs. Carlin and Westwood go back to southern Oregon with a fine appropriation for an army at Medford.

The Oregonian betrays its ignorance as usual, whenever it attempts to discuss southern Oregon affairs. It is exultant over the fact that the river is reopened to commercial fishing under the terms satisfactory to Grants Pass—which benefits no one but a score of poachers.

These terms provide that netting be permitted for a stretch of ten miles at Grants Pass, a hundred miles from the sea, where the river is narrow and unfit for commercial fishing, where every gravel reef is a spawning bed, where there are no canneries and the fish unfit for canning.

There is absolutely no justification for such a law. No commercial fisherman who understands the business will justify it. Not a member of either house or senate fisheries committees sanctioned it, save as a political expedient.

The bill becomes a law, not on its merits, but by log-rolling—and the Oregonian commends it simply because it was part of the steam roller's work—and because the governor vetoed it.

It is far more commendable in Mr. Reames to have been allied with Governor West, who initiated nearly all the meritorious work of the session, than it would have been to have been an office boy on the Oregonian's steam roller even though he could have lugged home to dazzle the natives, a fish bill or an armory appropriation, conclusive proof of statesmanship—a reward for taking orders.

THE DOC OR THE TURTLE?

WHILE a great part of the world is heaping praise upon Dr. Friedmann for his discovery of a possible cure for tuberculosis, let us not overlook the humbler partner in the case—the turtle. Isn't it possible that for centuries the turtle's shell has been fairly bursting with this great secret? As in any time of great stress the remedy appears, so now, when white plague statistics appall a world, appears the turtle.

Perhaps the turtle simply chose Dr. Friedmann for its interpreter and so gave to him the long kept secret. Had it not been Dr. Friedmann it would have been someone else—that great secret hadn't been hoarded all these thousands of years to depend upon any one man for translation! The turtle could get along without that particular doctor but where would that doctor be without the turtle? So we say that, while both are great, if the "cure" is a success the turtle is the greater man of the two. If the "cure" fails, man may still wonder, along with the doctor, as to why there should be such things as turtles.

Princetonians naturally were most elated over the great victory of their most esteemed resident at Baltimore and the prospect of seeing the former president of Princeton University in the White House, but when it came time for Mr. Wilson to leave Princeton, even though there was plenty of cheering and waving of hats and handkerchiefs, there was also a great feeling of sorrow. Mr. Wilson was always a favorite in his college town and will be greatly missed.

Why Is a Bald Headed Man?

Surgeon J. O. Cobb of the United States public health service, has scientifically studied the subject of baldness and declares that baldness is not due to a germ or parasite or disease, or dandruff, is not influenced by heredity, is not caused by excessive brain action, is not due to sex, in spite of the fact that women never bald, but is due simply to the tight hatband and heavy hair.

Baldness is distinctively a characteristic of civilization. Hypocrites and Aesculapians were bald. The mummy of Rameses II of Egypt is bald. The Papyrus Ebers (1500 B. C.) gives clear prescriptions for baldness. Most of the Greek and Roman philosophers were bald. It was not uncommon among the Jews. Dr. Cobb takes one by one the alleged causes and proves their falsity and thus comments upon the real causes.

Baldness is a habit disease. The majority of men when putting on their hats work them back and forth with one hand to make them fit snugly. The tight fitting hatband, whether of a stiff hat or a soft one, constricts a zone around the scalp which seriously interferes with the function of the nerves and blood-vessels passing under this zone. The tighter this band, the more certain of ultimate baldness, but even with tight bands and heavy hats, there is a certain percentage who escapes altogether. With these it is to be noticed that the shape of the head and mode of wearing the hair, has much to do in preventing the trouble. But if a man's head is very wide, or very round, or if he is very prominent fore and aft, that man will become bald in time, because such a person, to make his hat fit snugly, invariably pulls it down tight. The man with low brow, and thick, heavy hair rarely is bald. If one wears the hair long and thick, it acts as a cushion and prevents, in a large measure, the constriction caused by the hatband.

The top of the head is beautifully supplied with nerves and blood vessels which run from the neck up the sides of the skull, supplying the muscles, fascia, and hair follicles of the scalp to the very dome of the skull, where they unite in a beautiful network. Over this portion of the skull nature has placed, besides the muscles, skin, and fascia, a thick pad of fatty tissue, in which are imbedded these blood vessels and nerves. This cushion of fat protects the bloodvessels and nerves, and any thing which disturbs the nourishment of this part of the scalp will cause atrophy and thinning of the scalp, with consequent degeneration of the hair follicles, which will invariably be followed by incurable baldness.

The natural hair falls out and is replaced by a less vigorous growth, the hair coming back thinner and thinner each time, and more brittle, until finally for lack of sustenance it gives up the ghost, and is numbered with the departed.

To recapitulate:

Dandruff does not cause baldness. Baldness is not caused by a germ. Baldness is caused almost solely by the tight hatband.

The finer and thinner the hair, the more cure one must give it. Do not be alarmed when the hair falls out. Brush massage of the scalp, and pulling the scalp back and forth, vigorously, will stop it.

Wash the hair frequently.

Brush the hair often, the stiffer the brush the better.

Do not have the hair singed.

Do not have the hair cut short, even in summer.

Pull out all the loosened hair every day, and at the same time pull the scalp back and forth. Pulling the hair strengthens the hair roots.

Paraffin for washing the hair. The best and safest soap is plain castile.

And last of all, pad the hat band so it will be soft, and remember to never pull the hat down tight on the head.
