

MACHINERY FOR STERLING MINE IS BEING INSTALLED

Development of the Sterling placer mine, probably the most noted of its kind in southern Oregon, is to start in the near future and will be carried on rapidly, according to indications in this city. A large quantity of supplies and machinery is being shipped to the mine.

It is believed that construction work on the new high line ditch which will make it possible to mine much more ground will be started in the near future.

The mine is now owned by S. S. Bullis of New York who announced some time ago that he planned extensive development work.

The Sterling mine has been a heavy producer in the past and it is believed that it will again produce heavily when ditches are constructed making it possible to work the new ground available.

NEEDED RAINFALLS, WILL CLEAR SOON IS PREDICTION

The much needed rain which has been looked for by local orchardists arrived Wednesday morning, accompanied by flurries of snow. The weather bureau, however, predicts only occasional showers tonight and fair weather Thursday. The prediction issued today is: Occasional rain, Thursday generally fair. Northwest-westerly winds.

With only slightly over one-half the rainfall which usually falls recorded, the ranchers of the valley have been wanting more rain for the past month. It is hoped that the present precipitation is heavy enough to make up for a portion of the deficiency.

Reports from the Willamette valley today are to the effect that snow and rain began falling at an early hour today and is continuing.

ANDERSON SAYS WILL WIN FIGHT IN TEN ROUNDS

LOS ANGELES, Cal., March 12.—Ten rounds is the outside limit for Saturday's scheduled 20-round battle at Vernon, set today by both principals—Bud Anderson of Medford and Knockout Brown of New York.

Each lad has predicted that he will settle the aspirations of the other before the first double numbered session rolls around. Anderson really believes that he will administer the knockout punch much earlier than this, but explained that he set the tenth as a conservative limit just to be on the safe side. Brown is as confident that the same period will see Anderson a beaten boy.

Both fighters worked hard today. Tomorrow will mark the wind-up of their training. Betting remains at 10 to 9 with Anderson favorite.

MUNSEY AGAIN SEEKS MERGER G. O. P. FACTION

NEW YORK, March 12.—Apparently abandoning the idea that the progressives alone will prove strong enough to win the next battle of ballots from the democrats, Frank A. Munsey, millionaire publisher and close friend of Theodore Roosevelt, issued today an appeal to both progressives and republicans to meet on neutral ground and organize a new party.

Munsey says the republicans have plenty of money and have more newspapers than the progressives. He declares the plan to raise campaign funds by popular subscription has proven a failure, adding that "all attempts to raise money in considerable amounts in that way have proven flat failures."

The publisher suggests that if 40 percent of the republican voters pledge themselves to send delegates to a national conference and a like percentage of progressives will do the same it will mean victory.

MUCH PROBING TO BE DONE BY JURY

The grand jury which will convene at Jacksonville next Monday, has much work ahead of it according to District Attorney Kelly. Several matters are to be probed, the nature of which Mr. Kelly declines at this time to disclose.

"I think we will have rather a busy week of it," stated Kelly today. "There are a number of matters I intend to get to the bottom of. This investigating will be in addition to the ordinary criminal work of which there is considerable."

CITY OFFICIALS TO VISIT INTAKE SOON

At a special session of the city council held Tuesday evening, I. L. Hamilton submitted to the city council the proposition of selling his ranch to the city near the intake of the gravity water system for \$7500. The council has the matter under consideration and will visit the intake and ranch Sunday.

The Hamilton ranch consists of 340 acres and protests the intake on all sides. By purchasing it the city would be in a position to keep stock from contaminating the city's water supply.

DOOMED CONVICT ATTEMPTS ESCAPE

SAN QUENTIN, Cal., March 12.—Following sensational attempts to escape Carl Reidelbach and Paul Prantikos are under double guard in the state penitentiary here today. Prantikos, who is to die Friday for the murder of Policemen Finley and Castor in San Francisco, jumped from a low gallery as he was being led to the death cell. He climbed a 25-foot tower in the prison yard and for nearly an hour resisted all attempts to dislodge him. He was finally bound hand and foot and lowered down.

"Kill me now; I cannot wait until Friday," he pleaded on the way back to his cell.

Reidelbach, who terrorized the Los Angeles central police station with a freak infernal machine loaded with dynamite, was missed at the afternoon "check-up." Half an hour's search revealed him stretched out on a belt near the flywheel in the Jute mill, his body completely hidden.
