

### THREE COUNTIES TO BE ON SAME FAIR CIRCUIT THIS YEAR

A. K. Ware has returned from attending a meeting of the fair officials of Lane, Jackson and Douglas counties who organized what will be known as the Southern Oregon Fair Circuit. This step was taken as the result of the recent procedure of the Oregon legislature in abolishing district fairs.

The first fair on the Southern Oregon circuit will be held at Medford on September 10, 11, 12 and 13, followed by Roseburg's fair on September 17, 18, 19 and 20. Lane county's fair will be held at Eugene September 24, 25, 26 and 27. From Eugene most of the stock and exhibits will be shipped to Salem for the State fair, which will be held the following week.

The racing programs for the three Southern Oregon fairs are as near uniform as it was possible to make them. They include the usual trotting, pacing and running events. The purses for each of the three fairs aggregate \$3775. As far as financing their respective fairs, the three counties included in the organization will be distinct, their affiliation being chiefly for the purpose of arranging race cards and dates which will not conflict.

### MOB ARMED WITH CLUBS MEETS HAYWOOD

AKRON, Ohio, March 12.—More than 200 Akron citizens, armed with clubs, met William D. Haywood, an organizer for the I. W. W., when he stepped from a train here today. Police Captain Guillet then addressed as follows:

"You probably have heard, Haywood, that a strike is in progress among employees of Akron rubber concerns. I merely wish to inform you that any attempt on your part to incite the strikers to acts of violence will be met with your immediate arrest and deportation. Do you understand?"

Haywood said that he did and then accompanied a committee of strike leaders to union headquarters.

### FORCING SLAUGHTER OF OVER HUNDRED BILLS

OLYMPIA, Wash., March 13.—Angered because the house killed two of his pet measures, Senator Hutchison of Spokane is taking sweet revenge today by forcing the reading of every word in every bill that comes before the senate this, the last day of the session. He expects by means of his lone filibuster to kill off at least 100 bills. Denounced as childish by Senator Campbell, Hutchison moved to a seat near the secretaries' tables and kept tab on the readers forcing them to repeat every time they missed a word.

Walker had no explanation to make and was bound over.

### ROBERT BURGESS IS INJURED BY DOG

A bull dog owned by Dr. F. S. Barber became suddenly crazed this afternoon and savagely attacked Mrs. F. O. Burgess. Robert Burgess, her son, witnessed the attack and rushed to the rescue. Before the animal was subdued, he tore most of the clothes from Robert and badly lacerated his arms. As Mr. Burgess is being treated for extreme nervousness it is believed the shock will work a serious hardship on his system. The dog was killed.

A short time before the dog attacked Mrs. Burgess, Dr. Barber was stricken with appendicitis. He was taken to the hospital where he will be operated on this afternoon.

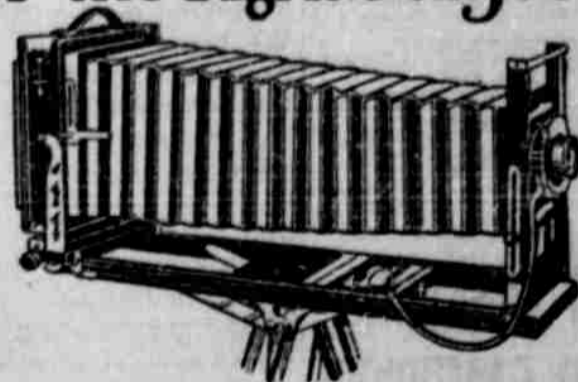
### WIRELESS MESSAGE SENT SEVEN THOUSAND MILES
