SOLONS URGED TO STAND FIRM FOR MINIMUM WAGE

CHICAGO, March 14.—An impassioned plea to state legislators not to let cries of "it will ruin Illinois" block legislation for a minimum wage law for women and girls was voiced here today by Miss Mary McDowell, head of the University of Chicago settlement house and a co-worker of Jane Addams.



"The fight for a minimum wage law," said Miss McDowell, "must go on. Public sentiment is too strong to permit business interests to block it."

"Lieutenant Governor O'Hara has been daring in bringing out the sordid facts, and I cannot believe that the state senators will surrender now. They all have been through too many legislative fights to be frightened by cries of 'it will ruin the state.'"

"A minimum wage law may not be on ideal piece of legislation; perhaps a federal law would be better, but anything that will improve the chances of girls to earn enough to live on will help. Everyone knows the difficulty experienced in getting laws through congress, and then the delay in having them approved by the supreme court."

"I believe that President Julius Rosenwald of Sears, Roebuck and company and other department store

heads who testified, are generous and kindhearted men, but that they are mistaken. They don't realize that when they fail to pay girls enough to clothe themselves properly they must make up the deficit otherwise.

"I have no patience with arguments that increased wage would be shouldered upon the public and the cost of living raised. The public pays the cost now—when a girl, toilworn, falls a victim to exhaustion and goes to the hospital or the poorhouse."

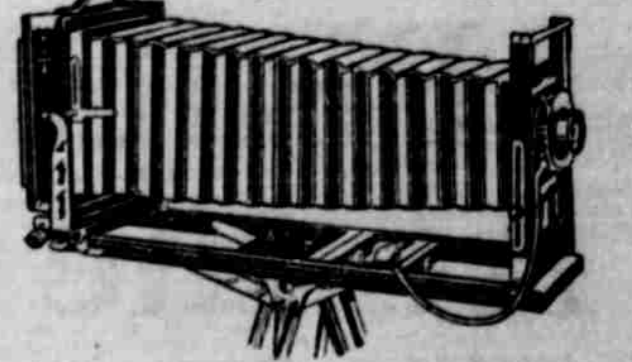
BURGLARS FRIEND, WIFE OF PREACHER, ARRESTED
