

CASE AGAINST MILLAR RESUMED BEFORE EIFERT

The case brought against George H. Millar by Mayor Elfert and City Attorney Boggs for alleged immorality, was resumed before Mayor Elfert this afternoon at 3 o'clock. The council chamber of the city hall, where the case is being heard, was jammed with spectators.

Millar has seven witnesses by which he expects to show that the charge against him is unfounded. He states that the only times he was ever in the Royal rooming house was when he visited that place on business for the Manhattan cafe.

Mayor Elfert, who as municipal judge forced the prosecution immediately after Millar's arrest Friday and heard the evidence for the prosecution, turned the case over to Justice of the Peace Glenn O. Taylor this afternoon to hear the evidence for the defense, on account of criticism of Elfert's conduct of the case by citizens.

Taylor refused to act and the mayor had to finish the hearing himself.

GIRL KILLS WILD CAT WITH A HAT PIN

SANTA MONICA, Cal., March 25.—Attacked by an enormous wildcat in Topanga canyon, near here, Miss Alma Judah killed the beast with a hatpin after she had sustained severe lacerations of the face, arms and body, according to information brought here today by a doctor who attended her.

After her battle with the cat, which ended when she rammed the hatpin through its eye into its brain, Miss Judah fainted. She was found an hour later by companions.

CITY ORDINANCE FORBIDS MINORS FROM SALOONS

No arrests have yet been made of minors who appeared before the grand jury and testified against the hotel men and liquor dealers of Medford, thereby securing their indictment. The minors who were members of the National Guard, were taken to Jacksonville by City Attorney Boggs.

Ordinance No. 287 of the City of Medford, reads as follows:
Section 1. It shall be unlawful for a minor to enter or be in any place within the City of Medford where the sale of intoxicating liquors in quantities of less than one gallon is or may any time hereafter be licensed.

Section 2. Any person who shall violate the provisions of the foregoing section of this ordinance shall upon conviction thereof be fined not less than Twenty (\$20) Dollars, nor more than Fifty (\$50) Dollars, and shall be imprisoned at labor for a period of not more than ten days.

Section 3.—It shall be unlawful for any minor to make any false statement to any person, now or at any time hereafter, licensed to sell intoxicating liquors in less quantities than one gallon, or to any agent, representative or employee of any such person, for the purpose of securing from such person, or his agent, representative or employee, any intoxicating liquor. Any person who shall be guilty of violating the provisions of this section of this ordinance shall upon conviction thereof be fined not less than Twenty (\$20) Dollars, or more than Fifty (\$50) Dollars, and shall be imprisoned at labor not less than five days nor more than ten days.

ONTARIO FLOODED WATER STILL RISING

GUELPH, Ontario, March 25.—All factories along the Speed river are flooded today and the waters are still rising. Immense property damage is reported and hundreds are homeless. The flood is the result of a terrific two day downpour.

BULGARIANS WIN TURKISH DEFENSE AT ADRIANOPLE

SOFIA, March 25.—After a day's desperate fighting before Adrianople, under the cover of siege guns, the Bulgarians captured the first line of Turkish defense, according to a statement from the war office here today. The statement confirmed the surrender of Djavid Pasha, the Turkish leader with 15,000 troops.

NEGRO KICKS UP ROW AT ROYAL

Notwithstanding the agitation directed by Mayor Elfert and City Attorney Boggs at the Royal Rooming house during the past week, that place is evidently still in a flourishing condition. This is indicated by the arrest of John Grier, colored, Monday night for creating a disturbance there. It is understood that three or four others were mixed up in the row.

The trouble is said to have started about ten o'clock when the negro mixed with a white man. When the

altercation was at its height, Mrs. Julia Levenberry, proprietress, telephoned for the police, who made the arrest.

Every effort to suppress the news of the trouble at the Royal was made Tuesday, but without success as the disturbance was heard by people on the streets. The police declined to discuss the affair. It is believed that they were acting under the orders of Mayor Elfert, but they declined to deny or affirm this.

The Royal is getting into the limelight frequently of late owing to the fact that it figured in the political storm of last week.
