

BUILD UP OREGON IS SLOGAN STATE WIDE CAMPAIGN

The Duke of Marlborough argues that a private landlord can administer his land more cheaply and efficiently than the State could do and he will endeavor to demonstrate his theories.

SHOWED FRIENDS ROPE HUNG HIMSELF WITH

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 26.—Thirty minutes after he had provoked laughter from a party of friends by displaying a hemp rope and remarking that he was going to commit suicide, Gus Eckert was found dangling from the end of a rope tied to a tree in the rear of his residence. He was a longshoreman.

MOTORCYCLIST HELD FOR DEATH OF LITTLE GIRL
