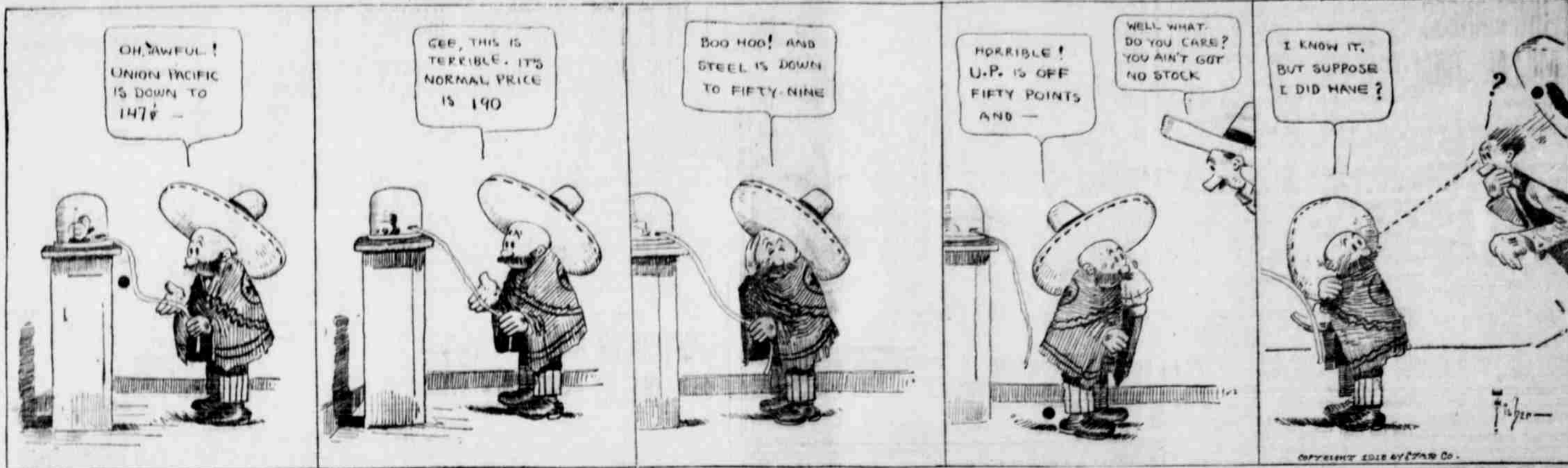


And Jeff Didn't Own a Cent's Worth of Stock
