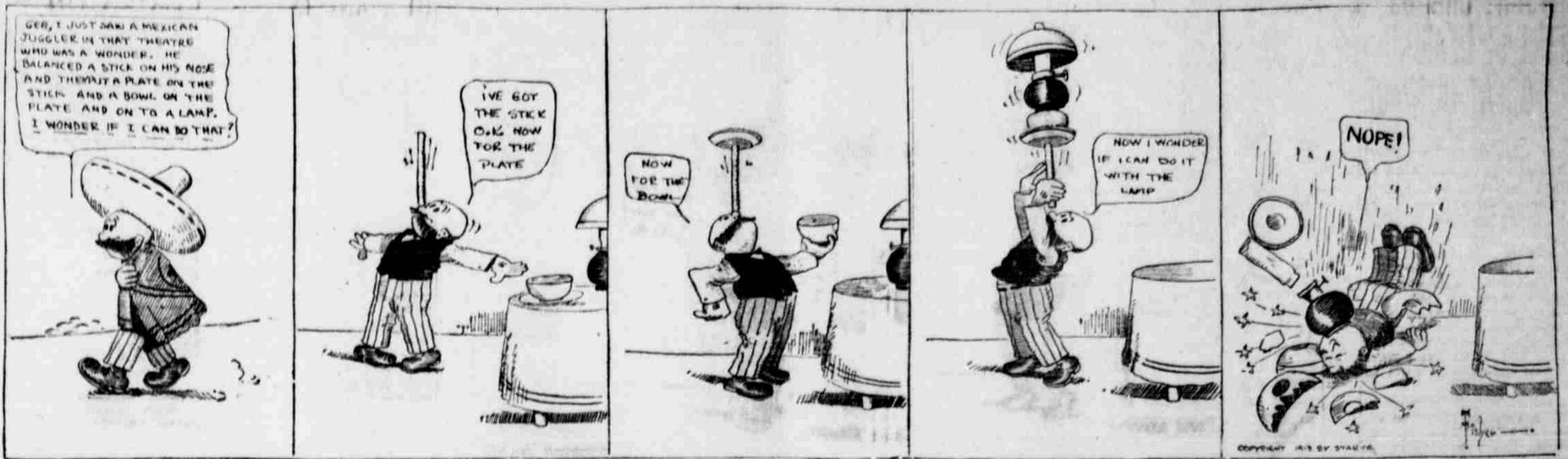


Well, You Can't Blame a Guy for Trying

UPPER VALLEY TO GET WATER

The foothills irrigation company has received signatures of enough land owners to put their enterprise through and work on the project will begin immediately. Engineer T. W. Osgood, who has been working on the proposition of bringing the waters of Keene creek over the divide to irrigate a total of 8000 acres in the vicinity of Ashland, Wagner creek, Coleman creek and Griffin creek, will direct the work. After carrying the water from Keene creek to Hiatt prairie a storage reservoir will be constructed to be two and a half miles long, an average of three-quarters of a mile wide and an average of about 25 feet deep. The ditch comes over the divide and crosses Bear creek at the George Owens place, coming to the west side of the valley at an 1850 foot level, coming through Ashland below the Southern Pacific railroad yards and above Helman's sulphur baths, and crossing the Southern Pacific railroad track on Wrights creek near Billings' crossing, after which it strikes the grade of the old Anderson mining ditch and continues its course until the DeRooban place on Griffin creek is reached.

The contracts call for water for the season of 1914 and the price is \$58.50 per acre, in 10 payments, with an upkeep of \$2.50 per acre annually. T. E. Beantlin, a Chicago capitalist, who bought the George Dewey place near Talent, is financing the enterprise.

One of the noticeable features of the undertaking was the readiness of land owners in signing up their acreage promptly.

The Waite tract across Bear creek signed up their holdings and will receive water from a point before the ditch crosses Bear creek.
