

### CAMPI AND BURNS TO FIGHT TODAY

LOS ANGELES, Cal., March 29.—Either Eddie Campi or Frankie Burns will have laid away any immediate hopes of grazing gloves with Johnny Coulon for the bantamweight title before the sun sets today. As the result of their scheduled twenty round meeting at Vernon, one will have to slip back to an easy seat near the foot of the pugilistic ladder, while the other travels along after Coulon via the Kid Williams route.

Both boys were easily within reach of the stipulated 11 pounds at noon when they rose today. Each loafed about his quarters until time to go to the Pacific Athletic club headquarters to weigh in.

The men were scheduled to answer the first gong at about 3 o'clock. The referee had not been selected early. Owing to the death of his mother, Charley Eytan was compelled to forego his usual Vernon officiating stunt. George Blake or Harry Gilmore was expected to be named.

### FRISCO'S BELT LINE DEDICATED TODAY

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., March 29.—In the presence of the governor, the mayor, members of the board of harbor commissioners and other notables, and made by a military parade, San Francisco's state-owned belt railroad connecting the docks with the heart of the city, was dedicated today. It is expected to carry the bulk of the 1915 fair traffic. The celebration began at 8 o'clock with a tug of the harbor in the tug Slocum. Following this the new docks between Harrison and Brennan streets were inspected. These docks are said to be the finest in the world. At 1:15 with the guests of honor in three coaches the first train on the belt line crossed Market Street. At the end of the run the party was taken to Fort Mason and then over the exposition grounds. At the presidio a military review was held.

### GRINDING OUT CRIMINAL CASES

The work of grinding out criminal cases in the circuit court is progressing rapidly and indications are that most of the criminal work will be cleaned up by next Wednesday. John Walker was put on trial for forgery today while the case against Walter Wood for pointing a gun at another went to a jury shortly before noon, the jury being still out. The embezzlement case against H. T. Haswell will probably be called Monday. It will be a harder fought case.

### OREGON DEBATERS WIN CHAMPIONSHIP

SEATTLE, Wash., March 29.—Stanford University debaters lost to the University of Washington team on the immigration debate held here Friday night by a decision of two to one. The coast championship, however, goes to the University of Oregon, which defeated Washington at Eugene and Stanford at Polta Alto, Washington, represented by Robin Wells and Clifford Newton, upheld the affirmative. The judges were Mayor Cotterill, Judge W. W. Black of Everett and W. C. Hodge of Snohomish. The Stanford debaters were Albert F. Coyle and P. D. Nowell.

### ELEVEN LOST LIFE AT MIDDLETOWN OHIO

MIDDLETOWN, Ohio, March 29.—Eleven persons are known to have met death in the flood waters here. The property loss is fixed at \$3,500,000. Miamisburg reports that three persons are known to be dead there, with the property damage estimated at \$350,000.

### O'GARA BACK FROM TOUR OF NORTHWEST

Professor O'Gara has returned from a tour of the fruit districts of the northwest looking over conditions and advising fruit men in regard to the control of blight which has gained considerable headway in several districts.

"I find that a policy of elimination rather than eradication is followed in several districts," states professor O'Gara, "and hundreds of trees are being pulled out. Especially is this so of the Bitter Root country. I spent some time there going over the matter with them."

"The Rogue River valley seems in better condition than any I visited and this is not said because I live here. It is a fact."

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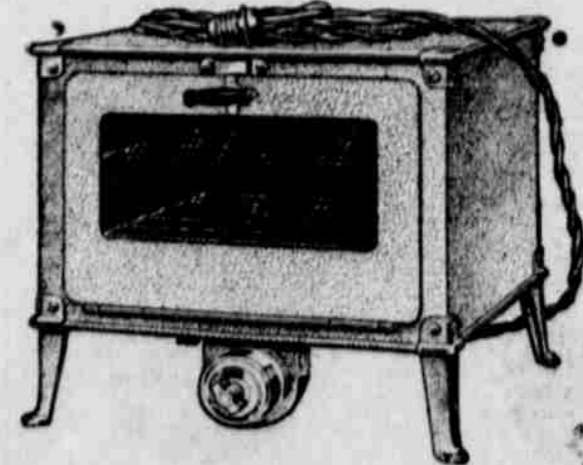
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
