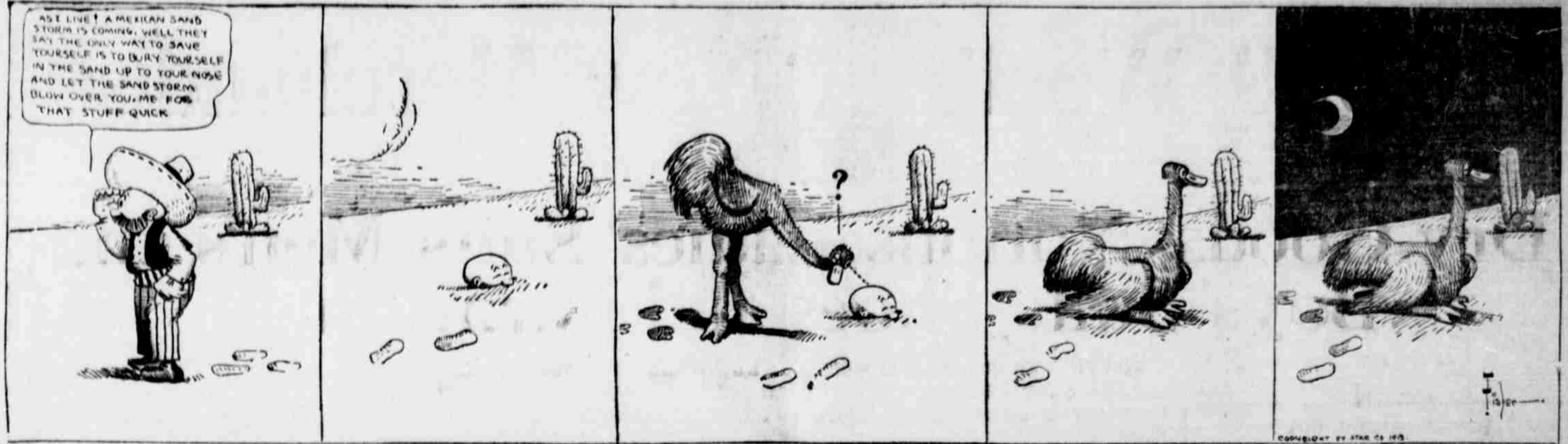

COSTS \$40,000,000 TO REBUILD DAYTON

DAYTON, Ohio, April 3.—Governor James Cox of Ohio, Miss Mabel Roadman of the Red Cross Society, and the members of the Ohio relief commission toured the city today, personally inspecting the damage wrought by the flood. Later they attended a lecture at which scenes of the actual flood and fire situation were shown by stereopticon. A map displayed at the lecture showed that it will cost \$40,000,000 to make Dayton normally habitable again.

TO FORCE MONTENEGRO TO OBEY MANDATES

LONDON, April 3.—Just as Montenegro has scored her first real success by getting a foothold at Tara-boach, the key to Scutari, the warships of the powers are gathering along the coast to compel her to give up her most precious fruit of five months fighting.

Austrian warships are already anchored off her shores and British and Italian war craft are on the way. Not even Russia is exempted from the powers which are joining in the demonstration. Should the demonstration prove ineffectual it is said Antivari and Dubucino will be occupied.

When the Montenegrin trouble is out of the way it is believed the powers will have to deal with Serbia which has declined to withdraw her troops from Scutari. Also Serbia too is preparing for the permanent occupation of Durazzo which is contrary to the decision of the powers.

PRESIDENT WILSON FRETS ON TARIFF ISSUES

WASHINGTON, April 3.—President Wilson is face to face with the most serious phases of the tariff revision today. With the work of the house ways and means committee before him and the extra session of congress only a few days away, the president has proceeded deep enough into the study of the tariff bill to realize that before the democratic caucuses meet there are many points upon which he must make a definite stand.

He admitted at the White House he would do so "in a day or two." It was declared also that the president had not made up his mind fully whether the tariff should be revised schedule by schedule or in a single bill; whether sugar will be placed on the free list or given a reasonable amount of protection and whether the income tax should be flat or graduated.
