Have you noticed the barren look about our public buildings and most of our homes? They don't look as if they belonged to the landscape, but rather as if they just happened. We don't use shrubs enough—place them about the foundations to tie the buildings to their surroundings.

Have you taken an unprejudiced view of your back yard? How does it look? Can't you clean it up here, sow a little grass seed there, put in a few shrubs and flower seeds somewhere else? For some helpful suggestions along these lines look on page 101 in the April issue of the Ladies' Home Journal.

Have you signed the amended constitution of the Greater Medford club and received a membership card? If you haven't done so, don't fail to do it at the first opportunity. This card, which is not transferable, admits the bearer to any federated club in the state or in the United States, and is invaluable when one is traveling or visiting elsewhere.
