THERE is mourning in Medford over the death of Ed Root, friend to everyone and especial friend to a dozen generations of children. For over forty years he has been a familiar character in the Rogue River valley, with a kindly word of welcome and a cheery greeting for all.

In early youth a cyclone destroyed the Root home in Comanche, Iowa, killing the father, injuring Ed and wrecking the family fortunes. With his mother, Ed came to Oregon, where for many years she taught music. Her memory was enshrined as that of a saint in the heart of her son, and the mention of her name always brought tears to his eyes.

Whatever there might have been coarse and vulgar, whatever there might have been selfish and egotistical, whatever there might have been grasping and mean in the nature of Ed Root was carried away in that Iowa storm of many years ago. If the storm also took the fruit of knowledge, with its serpent venom fraught, it was not altogether unkind to him. It left him the rapid fire wit that in another age would have graced the court of a king.

It is fitting that this friend of the children should be remembered by the children as all that is mortal of him is laid to rest. Every child in Medford should bring a flower to lay upon his bier as a pleasant recollection of the past, to adorn the film of memory in after years.

It is not a time for sorrow, for Ed Root, one of those sons of man who had not where to lay his head, has only left a world that illy treated him for his Father's mansion. And have we not the eternal promise: "Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God."

ARBOR DAY AT ROOSEVELT SCHOOL PRESBYTERIANS ELECT OFFICERS

The Roosevelt school will observe Arbor Day on April 11, with an elaborate program in which every grade and teacher will assist. The children have been saving a penny a week for the past six weeks and with this they have purchased twenty choice rose bushes. These are to be planted on the lawn fronting the school, between the row of popular trees.

In front of the entrance an arbor will be constructed and over this Marchiel Neil roses will be allowed to vine. Some vines of Virginia creepers will be planted to help cover the trellis.

On each side of the steps a row of roses will be planted, the varieties used will be Killarney, Madam Cochet and Bridesmaid. Several lilacs will be used and also five elm trees, each to be planted by a grade. The teachers will plant Boston Ivy.

The school will try to secure the services of B. F. Mulkey as speaker of the day, and also J. S. Howard to tell the children stories of his early life among the hills of New England. If possible the superintendent of schools, U. S. Collins, will also address the children. The pupils will entertain with a program of songs and recitations. The public is invited.

SECOND HAND DEALER RELEASED ON \$300 BAIL Henry Lerch, second hand dealer, was released yesterday from jail on a \$300 bond. BREAD RIOTING MARKS TWINE STRIKE

AUBURN, N. Y., April 5.—Blood rioting again marked the strike here today of workers in Auburn's big twine mills. The trouble started when 300 strikers stoned machinists entering the International Harvester twine mill and the Columbian rope plant. Soldiers and police dispersed the crowds, but not until a number of the combatants had suffered broken heads.

Two companies of militia who arrived here today to maintain order were ordered to "shoot to kill if yesterday's trouble, when four men and two women, all strikers, were shot, is repeated.

CITY COUNCIL AWARDS BRIDGE PAVING CONTRACT

Bids for the paving of Bear creek bridge and the approaches thereto were awarded at the adjourned meeting of the council Friday night, the award being given to the Clarke-Henry company, although the bid of Schell and Schell was \$27,400 lower, according to the report of the city engineer. The Clarke-Henry bid for the work was \$3,882.90, and Schell and Schell \$3,955.50.
