MRS. TRUAX FIRST COUNCILWOMAN IN SOUTHERN OREGON

As the result of the annual election held at Gold Hill Wednesday, Mrs. Cora J. Truax will be the first woman to serve on a city council in southern Oregon. Mrs. Truax defeated S. T. Hodges for this honor and will represent the second ward. Mrs. Truax received 83 votes to Hodges' 25.

T. W. Ray was elected councilman in the first ward over W. L. Walker by a vote of 60 to 27. W. P. Weatheral was named recorder, L. W. Smith treasurer and Roy Cameron councilman-at-large.

WAREHOUSE TO BE TORN DOWN

The Davis warehouse, occupied by J. C. Schmidt, feed dealer, is to be torn down and removed from the railroad right of way. The lease has expired on the building and it has been ordered removed at once.

For some time an agitation has been carried on for the removal of the warehouses in order that the center of the city may be paraded and beautified. The removal of this warehouse indicates that the railroad company will order them down as rapidly as the leases expire.

LARGEST HOTEL IN WORLD FOR CHICAGO

CHICAGO, April 10.—Scheduled to cost \$13,000,000, the new Morrison hotel will be started here in a few months. The hostelry will contain 2240 rooms, with a bath for each room, and will be 21 stories in height. It is said the structure will be the largest hotel in the world.

It is proposed to erect the hotel in sections. The first section will be opened as soon as it is completed and the others will be built while the first is doing business.

90 DAY EXTENTION IS GIVEN HOLDERS TROLLEY FRANCHISE

At a special meeting of the city council Wednesday evening 90 additional days were granted the holders of the interurban trolley franchise in which to begin work. An ordinance to that effect will be passed this evening. The time limit placed in the franchise at the time it was first granted expires today. The additional time granted will expire July 10. The \$2,500 guarantee will hold.

The franchise was recently disposed of by the M. T. Minney company to F. B. Waite of Roseburg and associates, who are local men. The unexpired time was not considered sufficient by the new holders to work out their plans. The city loses nothing by the extension of time as the \$2,500 forfeit still holds.
