

ENTERPRISING FIRMS SHOW FAITH IN CITY'S FUTURE

A Medford firm that is developing and spending its money with an idea to the future growth of the city is the Shapleigh Hardware company, which is soon to move into larger quarters on East Main street. The Shapleigh company tried to buy one of the most desirable downtown lots for their store, but failing to secure it they have taken a long lease on the building now occupied by the Hell meat market and owned by W. S. Barnum. A large addition to this building is now being erected and the firm hopes to be ready for business in the new location by the first of May.

An indication in the firm's belief in a greater Medford is shown by a recent shipment of a whole carload of stoves and ranges and by the fact that they have rented considerable floor space in the new bonded warehouse to store this and future shipments. In the new store the Shapleigh company will be able to house twice the stock they have been carrying in their South Central store. The firm is one of the strongest believers in the future of Medford and is backing up its judgment with hard cash.

Another Medford firm that is branching out and working to its full capacity is the Medford Sash & Door company, which has work on hand to keep the force busy for some time. Orders come to this local concern from quite a distance south of the California line and from as far north as Roseburg.

The Korinek Medicine company on North Fir street has painted the building it is occupying and has taken a lease on the place with the privilege of buying. Already quite a force is busy and the management believes it has made a wise choice in coming to Medford.

With the Page theater near completion, the bonded warehouse almost ready for business, the new Pantorium plant completed, and a general tone for the better in the retail business, Medford merchants and contractors are anticipating a good season.

ARGUE DEMURRER IN LIQUOR CASES

The demurrer to the indictments against the Medford liquor dealers was argued this morning in the circuit court and the matter taken under advisement. In all probability Judge Calkins will rule on the demurrer within the next week.

The arguments were exhaustive, a large number of cases being cited. It is believed that the questions raised will have to go to the supreme court.
