FIRST GAME OF SEASON, PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Ore., April 15.—When Mayor Rushtlight hurled the first ball at the plate this afternoon in the Los Angeles-Portland game, which initiated the Pacific Coast league season in Portland, it was estimated that more than 14,000 fans and fanettes were within the enclosure at the Vaughn street grounds. Manager McCredie sent his star southpaw, Harry Krause, to the mound, with Charley Chech of Los Angeles performing a like service for Los Angeles. The game was preceded by the greatest parade ever held in connection with the opening of a baseball season in the northwest. It resembled the pageants of Rose Festival week and the Elks' convention. There were six divisions in the parade, each headed by a band, with the Los Angeles and Portland ball tossers in the vanguard. Fears that rain would interfere with the opening of the season were dispated at noon, when Old Sol began a winning battle with the rain clouds. When the bell clanged it was still somewhat cloudy, but ideal baseball weather.

SAILORS MUST BE VACCINATED

SEATTLE, Wash., April 15.—Steerage passengers and members of the crews on all vessels sailing to Alaska hereafter will have to be vaccinated or show a certificate of vaccination not more than five years old before they will be allowed to sail, according to a ruling of the department of public health at Washington, D. C., which went into effect this morning. The reason for the promulgation of this order and why Alaska is singled out and made the coast, is a mystery to Seattle steamship men. Although first-class passengers and tourists are exempt from the restrictions, shipping men say, the result of the order will be to spread false impressions broadcast over the country which will interfere seriously with the summer excursions to the north, which yearly are growing more popular and add greatly to the business of this port.

(Continued from page 1.) the immigration here as much as possible. "Of late, many American farmers have been migrating to Canada. Why? Because the land laws there make it possible for them to make a better living. The farmers who are going and who have gone are the sturdy of Americans. It should be our first function to ameliorate the conditions which are driving them away. After that let us think of inviting the immigrant. Before any other phase is considered we must think of bread and butter. To invite immigrants in by the thousands is to aggravate the condition that makes willing workers more plentiful than jobs. To aggravate this condition is to promote unrest. "To the people who believe that the great influx of foreigners will not be a wedge to lift us up to a higher plane I say that the influx will be a wave that will destroy the prospects of American workers. The speaker showed by figures that on account of the large holdings in California the average acreage of each farm is 316.7 a tremendous size when compared with other states, and that but 41 per cent of the land occupied by farms has been improved.

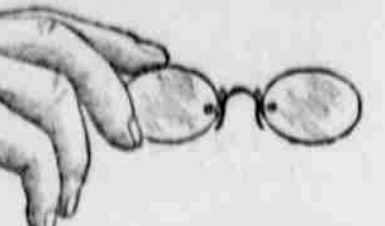
