

MRS. ELZIRA CLAY TO BE GIVEN HEARING DETERMINE SANITY

A complaint was filed Tuesday against Mrs. Elzira Clay of this city, charging that she is unfit to be a large, owing to her mental condition. She will be given a hearing before County Judge Tou Velle Wednesday to determine her sanity. Mrs. Clay has been indulging in a number of weird actions recently which have led her friends to question her sanity. She has been active at the county seat, taking a great interest in the case against Cecil Townsend. When Townsend was taken to Salem Saturday by Sheriff Singler she telephoned Governor West that a great mistake had been made and wanted Townsend released. The governor did considerable telephoning before he learned the true facts.

ARRAIGN WEALTHY SAN DIEGO RANCHER

SAN DIEGO, Cal., April 15.—Arraignment of Rex B. Clark, wealthy rancher, in bitter fashion, Attorney George Shreve today began his argument for the defense in the case of H. S. Ervay, on trial for alleged seduction of Elsie M. Johnston under promise of marriage. Calling Clark a perjurer, an adulterer and other names, Shreve by turns walked from his chair to the witness chair, pointed his finger at Clark and struck the table.

The attorney charged that Clark, who was formerly secretary of the county highway commission under Commissioners John D. Spreckels, A. G. Spalding and E. W. Scripps, had been responsible for Miss Johnston's plight and then sought to fasten it on Ervay, who succeeded Clark as secretary of the commission.

Shreve charged that Clark had meanwhile deceived his wife, who was Miss Grace Scripps of Detroit, in order, Shreve charged, to keep "the millions he had gotten by that marriage."

Clark sat still under the arraignment. He was noticeably pale. The case is expected to go to the jury late today.

MOTHER STEALS CHILD FROM DIVORCED SPOUSE

FORT PAYNE, Alabama, April 15.—For kidnapping her six-year-old daughter, after stealing quietly into town from her home in California, Mrs. Charles Minnett is being sought by the police here today. The Minnetts were divorced a short time ago and the custody of their two girls was given to the father.

The elder child refused to leave her father. The younger, but recently returned from a kindergarten, accompanied her mother willingly.

NEW ASSISTANTS TO STATE SUPERINTENDENT

SALEM, Ore., April 15.—J. A. Churchill who will succeed State School Superintendent Alderman, July 1, announced he would appoint Frank Wells of Pendleton as second assistant state superintendent. Wells for twenty years has been school superintendent of Umatilla county. Churchill had already announced that E. F. Carleton, the present first assistant superintendent would be retained in that position.

HAMMER MURDERER EXAMINED FOR LUNACY

SAN JOSE, Cal., April 15.—A commission in lunacy will examine Tom Shearin, the Bell station rancher who shot and killed Henry Beneker and then crushed his head with a hammer, according to announcement here today by District Attorney A. M. Free. Shearin is in jail at Gilroy pending a preliminary investigation. Mrs. Beneker, the young widow of the slain man, who witnessed the killing, also believes that Shearin is insane.

WASHINGTON, April 15.—Discussion of the agricultural products schedule of the proposed new tariff bill was continued by the house democratic caucuses today. The first item considered was the provision for a 10 per cent duty on wheat, with Minnesota representatives bitterly attacking the paragraph.

FIRST PUBLIC APPEARANCE OF CZAREWITCH SINCE HIS INJURY IN MARCH OF LAST YEAR.



The first public appearance of the heir to the throne of Russia since he was mysteriously injured last year was in March, on the occasion of the celebration of the third centenary of the house of Romanoff. Then he

rode publicly in a coach with his father, Czar Nicholas, probably for the purpose of proving to the public that the czarwitsch was in good health and to set aside rumors. The mysterious illness of last year

has never been explained. One story had it that the czarwitsch was attacked while on the royal yacht, and another that he was the victim of a nihilist on one of the country places of the reigning family.

ALIEN LAND BILLS IN LOWER HOUSE

SACRAMENTO, Cal., April 15.—The assembly substitute anti-alien land bill will come before the lower house for discussion on special order today at 11 o'clock. Amendments to the bill, which is now on third reading, probably will be offered, and it is expected that the debate will last throughout the day, as much opposition to the measure, as it now stands, has been evidenced.

The assembly substitute bill makes no mention of treaty obligations, and is said to be aimed directly at the Japanese. It provides that property held by aliens shall revert to the state at the end of a year unless the owners declare they have intention of becoming citizens of the United States.

The senate substitute, which is also on third reading, gives a longer period for the alien to qualify for ownership, and is drawn, advocates of the bill declare, with a view of maintaining existing treaty rights.

ELOPERS SURRENDER TO FEDERAL OFFICERS

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., April 15.—Maury I. Diggs and Drew Caminetti, Sacramento young men accused of violating the Mann white slave act in taking Marsha Warrington and Lola Norris to Reno will surrender themselves to the United States marshal tomorrow morning and make bond, according to United States District Attorney McNab.

Attorney Charles B. Harris of Sacramento, indicted with Diggs on the charge of conspiracy to suborn perjury, was to be arraigned yesterday before United States Judge Van Fleet at Sacramento. He will plead tomorrow.

Diggs and Caminetti and the three brokers indicted will be arraigned here next Monday morning.

SHOT BY HUSBAND WHO SHOT HIMSELF

ELCENTRO, Cal., April 15.—Shot through the breast by her husband, Mrs. Walter Dean is dead today, and Dean, who attempted to kill himself with the same revolver, is near death in a hospital. No cause of the crime is known.

Mrs. Dean returned from a visit to friends late last evening. As she entered the couple's apartment Dean shot her. He fled from the place and after running two blocks shot himself. He then dragged himself back to the room where his wife lay dead, and was arrested there.

Funeral Services.
Funeral services over the remains of the late Guy E. Gaunyaw will be held in Weeks & McGowan's chapel Wednesday afternoon at 2:20 o'clock. Rev. Boyle officiating. Interment I. O. O. F. cemetery.

The remains were received Tuesday. He died at Provoost, Alta., from acute indigestion April 9, 1913, aged 33 years 6 months 7 days. Besides a brother and two sisters in this city he leaves a wife and a child.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., April 15.—Putting forth the argument that a birth certificate is not a public record as a loophole whereby to free their client, attorneys of Dr. Fraser, the Weaverville, Cal., physician, who is accused of falsifying such a record in this city, created a mild sensation in Dr. Fraser's hearing here today. Both the defense and prosecution were given until next Tuesday to discover the legal status of a birth record.

Dr. Fraser is accused of aiding in the substitution of a live baby for the stillborn heir of Lieutenant Charles Henry Slingsby, who controls vast English estates.

AMUNDSON LOST IN WILDS OF SPOKANE

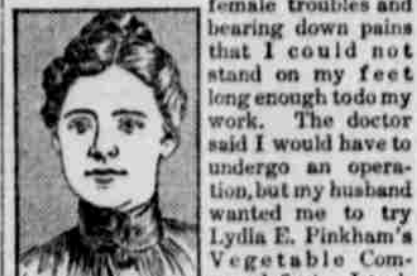
