THE MORE COMPETITION THE BETTER.

IN order to protect itself from fancied competition, the Oregon Gas and Electric Company has appealed to the state railroad commission to head off, if possible, a competing public utility from being granted a franchise.

The company claims that it is losing money in Medford and takes a crack at the city, as if the city was to blame for its own mis-management. It says the city has lost population and that in its opinion, a competing franchise would be almost a crime.

If the Oregon Gas and Electric Company, which by the way is a branch of the California gas trust organized to milk Oregon towns for the benefit of non-residents, have made a poor investment and cannot make both ends meet, it is its own fault. When it purchased the plant from its promoters, it did not have a self-sustaining patronage and its policy of antagonizing everyone it did business with, has not increased its popularity.

If the state railroad commission has power to prevent legitimate competition that will reduce the cost of gas to the consumer, it should be abolished. But it has no such power, and the appeal is as useless as it is absurd.

Next the gas company will be asking for an injunction to restrain the power company from furnishing electric lights and heat in competition, and to increase its rates enough to pay interest on watered stock.

The more competition the better, and the lower the rates, the better.

SIGN UP FOR WATER.

IF you want things to hum in the Rogue river valley, help secure the construction of the irrigation system.

The main reason people are not flocking here as a couple of years ago, is because orchards are not irrigated. People understand pretty thoroughly that water is essential for fruit growing.

If you want the tonnage of fruit and produce shipped from here that is shipped from other fruit and garden districts, you must get water on to the land.

If you want to make barren land productive, get water upon it—no matter what the cost, the water will pay it.

If you want to increase the value of your land, and to make it all productive, place it under irrigation.

Upon irrigation depends the valley's future. Now is the time to secure it and have water all over the valley by the time the Panama fair brings its thousands of home seekers and colonists.

If you own land yourself, sign up. If you have a friend that owns, urge him to. You have twenty years to pay for the cost of the water and can make it pay for itself.

PNEUMONIA CURE
NOW ANNOUNCED

NEW YORK, April 19.—Declared to be as effective in its results as Dr. Frederick Franz Friedmann's reputed cure for tuberculosis, a positive cure for pneumonia is discovered by investigators at the Rockefeller Institute here, according to an announcement made by Dr. McWilliams, of the institute staff, today.

It is stated the cure overcomes both the species of germs causing pneumonia, but its composition is being kept a secret. Many patients for whom there was practically no hope, were speedily cured by the serum, according to Dr. McWilliams.

SAN DIEGO FAIR
BILL APPROPRIATION

SACRAMENTO, Cal., April 19.—A bill appropriating \$200,000 for a California state building at the Panama-California exposition in San Diego in 1915 is being considered today by the finance committee of the senate. The bill passed the assembly some time ago.

Bills appropriating \$250,000 for an exhibit at the exposition, one appropriating \$25,000 for the improvement of the grounds, another providing \$50,000 for furnishings and equipment, and another appropriating \$10,000 for a heating plant still are in the ways and means committee of the assembly.

NELSON CLEARED;
COURT IN ERROR

KANSAS CITY, Mo., April 19.—Holding that Circuit Judge Guthrie erred in adjudging Colonel William R. Nelson, editor of the Kansas City Star, in contempt for criticising a court decision in a divorce case, Commissioner Crow filed his opinion with the state supreme court. He held that a newspaper had a right to place a reasonable construction on the action and orders of courts as long as it did not impugn the court's motives and charge matters tending to bring the court in disrepute. Crow held that the evidence in the Nelson case does not show impugning.

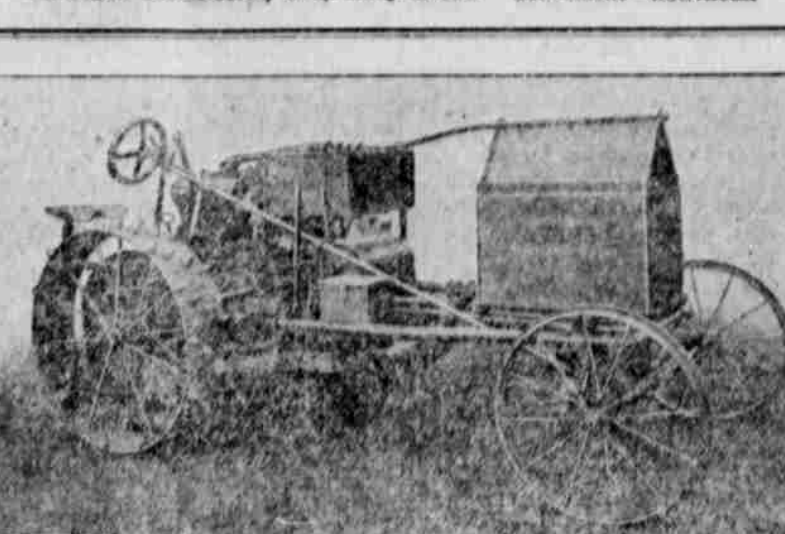
