CHAMBERLAIN IN FAVOR OF REPEALING BRITISH TREATY

WASHINGTON, April 22.—Demand for the abrogation of the two treaties with Great Britain bearing upon the Isthmian canal rights was presented to the senate today by a resolution of Chamberlain of Oregon brought a new element to the canal controversy now in progress between this country and Great Britain over the right of the United States to exempt American coastwise ships from the payment of tolls. Senator O'Gorman, chairman of the inter-oceanic canal committee which must handle canal legislation in the senate endorsed tonight the principle embodied in the Chamberlain resolution.

PENDLETON, Ore., April 22.—Although practically beaten in the third round, Jack Parres of Saginaw, Mich., stayed until the 18th round of a scheduled twenty round bout here with Jack Duarte of Portland and his punishment absorbing ability is creating much comment among local fans today. Both are middleweights. Parres was floored twice in the second round and in the third appeared all but out. However, in the next fifteen rounds he took an awful beating, always coming back for more with a smile on his battered face. He was knocked down fully fifteen times and took the count in the eighteenth.

MAGNATES UNWORRIED BY FEDERAL PROBE

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., April 22.—President Al Baum of the Pacific Coast league was not alarmed by the news from Washington that a resolution had been presented to the lower house of congress demanding an investigation of organized baseball. "The present system of running the game," he said, "is absolutely necessary to its success and is responsible for its present high standard. The players, instead of having been downtrodden under this system, have benefited vastly by it. Salaries have increased from 50 to 200 per cent. Fifteen years ago a star player received about \$1200 for a season's work. A few days ago Ruben Marquard signed to pitch for the New York Giants for \$8500 a season. You cannot call that slavery, can you?"

SHIP BLOWN STERN FOREMOST INTO LUMBER SCHOONER

SEATTLE, Wash., April 22.—Dragging her anchor, which were unable to hold against the strong southwest wind which swept Port Townsend harbor yesterday afternoon, the British ship Claverdon was blown stern foremost into the American schooner Defender. BLOCKADE FAILS TO CHECK WAR OF TONGS

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., April 22.—Unchecked by federal interference and a police blockade of Chinatown, the war between the Sing Kong and Suey Sing tong is on here today. Representatives of the tongs have met three times since the beginning of the week in an effort to make peace, but all their efforts have thus far ended in failure. It is expected that the murderous campaign of the tong men will be renewed at once. The blockade of Chinatown still is being maintained but the tong men appear to be thriving on the stagnation of trade in the district, and the loud protests of the Chinese merchants. It is rumored that the powerful Hop Sing tong, made up of merchants, will start some gun fighting on its own account if the two warring tongs do not come to terms in the near future.

QUIMBY SEEKS MURDER TRIAL

ABERDEEN, Wash., April 22.—To settle the blame for the shooting of John Tornow, Chehalis county bandit, Deputy Sheriff Giles Quimby has asked that he be tried for first degree murder. Quimby told Deputy Prosecuting Attorney A. E. Cross that he wished to be tried so that friends or relatives of the outlaw may never have a chance to institute civil or criminal proceedings against him. Quimby demanded a hearing while the posse was gathered around the body of Tornow and his latest victims, Thursday afternoon, but was refused by Sheriff Mathews, who declared it was not necessary. Quimby will be tried if he insists on that course. Rewards amounting to \$5000 will be paid to Quimby. The sale of postcards of Tornow's body and his cabin began yesterday and were eagerly sought. Quimby allowed the motion picture men to photograph him, but he turned down all offers of vaudeville contracts.

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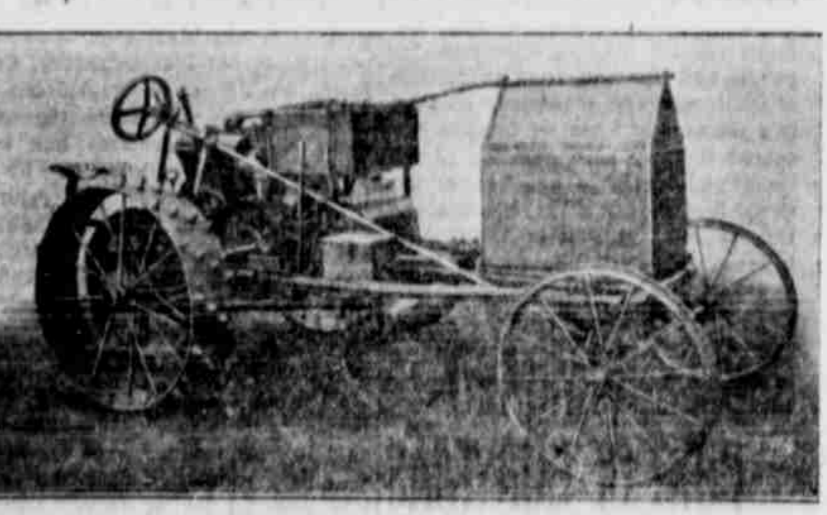
