"POP" ANSON.

When it comes to relating about "past performances" there is no other figure in the base ball world who is better qualified to speak than "Pop" Anson, the famous manager of the old Chicago White Stockings.

The history of this star reads like romance. From his infancy his name was closely and intimately connected with base ball.

He was a principal and active figure when the "great American game" was in swaddling clothes, and through all the years of its development he took an active and prominent part.

When this old scout first started to covort around a diamond a score of 140 to 121 was considered a "good game."

He was a star player then, and later, as the science of the game advanced and "slugging" took a minor part in deciding the outcome of a contest, he was still in the lead as a player of brains and skill.

Today, at sixty, he still gives all who see him their money's worth—and a little extra—although not on the diamond. Following the natural order of things "Pop" has gone on the stage, and unlike numerous celebrities in their respective fields, he is proving to be as skillful and entertaining before the footlights as he was before the thousands who cheered his every play during his twenty-seven years on the ball field.

And speaking of base ball brings to mind that there is practically nothing new in the art of playing the game. If there has been any advancement whatsoever, in the playing end of the game, it has been in the pitching.

The pitchers of today are no doubt more effective than those of old. In fact, if it had not been for the advent of the Spalding Cork Center ball there would have been some legislation against the pitcher.
