

FUNERAL OF LATE SHERIFF TO BE HELD EARLY TOMORROW

The funeral of August D. Singler, sheriff, who was slain in a revolver duel Tuesday night with Lester Jones, whom he was attempting to place under arrest, will be held from the Catholic church in this city Friday morning. Out of respect to the late sheriff all of the business houses in the city have been requested through a proclamation of the mayor to close between the hours of 9:30 and 10:30 a. m.

The funeral will probably be one of the largest ever held in the city. The various organizations with which Singler was associated will attend, as will all of the county officials. The services at the church will be held at 9 o'clock, interment in the I. O. O. F. cemetery.

The county court Wednesday afternoon appointed William Singler, a brother of the late sheriff, to fill the unexpired term. He will take his oath of office soon. All of the deputies named by Sheriff Singler were continued in office. William Singler has agreed to care for his brother's widow and children.

County Judge Tou Velle, who is judge of the juvenile court under whose jurisdiction the operation of the dependent mothers' pension law comes, has already taken steps to invoke the aid of that law in behalf of Mrs. Singler and the children. It is in effect in June.

RELEASED MANIAC SHOOTS BROTHER

LOS ANGELES, Cal., April 24.—After a terrific fight in a crowded lobby of the Hollenbeck hotel, during which he shot and fatally wounded his brother and less seriously hurt a bystander, John L. Doak is in jail here today. He was captured after a sensational chase through crowded business streets, following which he barricaded himself in his brother's home and exchanged several shots with pursuing police.

L. S. Doak of Los Angeles was shot through the abdomen and according to hospital physicians cannot recover. Frank Metz of Los Angeles, who was standing in the hotel lobby, received a bullet in his right ankle. W. Z. English of Ocean side was cut about the face when one of Doak's bullets shattered a meerschaum pipe he was smoking. Doak recently was released from an asylum at Salem, Ore. He came to the home of his brother here, where he was joined by his father, Thomas Doak, of San Diego. The shooting last night, the father stated was the result of Doak's hallucinations that his brother had alienated his wife's affections.

RHODE ISLAND RED NOW LEADS EGG RACE

A Rhode Island Red scores today. When Glenn Allen, a school boy who lives at 311 South Oakdale, staggered into the office under the weight of a mammoth hen's egg, his bid was put in the class with Mrs. Bittner's White Leghorn and Miss Phipps' Crystal Orpington. Glenn's egg measured 7 5/8 inches in the larger circumference and 6 3/8 in the smaller and, while it is slightly smaller than the Orpington egg, it beats out the Leghorn by a small margin.

The Rogue river valley has proven that when it comes to record breaking eggs it can produce them from at least three varieties of hens. Glenn says there were no peculiar circumstances about his egg the hen just up and laid it. Who can beat it?

FAVOR ABOLITION OF LEGISLATURE

SACRAMENTO, Cal., April 24.—Declaring that the plan would reduce the daily expense of the legislature from \$1000 to \$2500 per day and that legislation would be greatly facilitated, eight senators are today urging the adoption of their constitutional amendment providing for the abolition of the present senate and assembly and substituting a law-making body of 40 members.

The amendment is considered non-partisan, as four democrats and four republicans were the framers. They are Senators Carr, Avey, Boynton, Campbell, Cartwright, Owens, Cohn and Gates.

Plans for constitutional amendments similar to the one framed by the senators have been discussed in the assembly.

JACKSON ROAD IS TO BE GRADED

Street Commissioner O. J. Patton announced today that he would put his crew at work as soon as possible grading Jackson street between the east end of the bridge and the pavement in order to eliminate the present hardships encountered in passing over the road. Patton's announcement followed an announcement by the East Siders that they would circulate petitions to have the road graded.

FROST KING DRAWS OFF HIS LEGIONS

MERLIN MAN GUILTY OF INCEST SAYS JURY

GRANTS PASS, April 24.—Wm. F. Pettitt, the Merlin man who was indicted by the grand jury on two separate counts for incest, was convicted by a jury in the circuit court yesterday. Prosecutor Kelly conducting the case, the complaining witness being his own daughter Julia and Pettitt's wife, the latter being an invalid and an inmate of the county home. The offense upon which the indictment was returned was alleged to have been committed at the county home during the holiday season last winter, the girl being at the home with her mother, and Pettitt having secured the permission of the court to visit his family. The girl on the witness stand Wednesday forenoon testified that the offense with the father as charged had also been committed at divers other times and places.

Emil Seig, who was indicted for grand larceny for the theft of a bicycle from B. R. Coffenberry, entered a plea of guilty to common larceny in the circuit court, and will be sentenced later.

MUST STAND TRIAL FOR SHOOTING JOYRIDER

GRANTS PASS, April 24.—G. A. Baldwin, who last fall shot at an automobile load of high school boys who were out for a joy ride, wounding Don Belding in the thigh, will have to stand trial in the circuit court on a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon, the grand jury having returned an indictment against him. Bail was placed at \$200 and Baldwin is out pending the calling of the case in the present term of court.

Baldwin, who lives two miles southwest of town on the Pacific highway, took a shot at a passing automobile one evening last October, claiming that the boys who were riding in it were shooting at his dog with a revolver. The shot fired by Baldwin struck young Belding in the leg, inflicting a flesh wound. Seven high school boys were in the automobile and Belding was riding on the running board. The boys claim that they were shooting at jackrabbits and did not shoot at the Baldwin dog.
