

JOSEPHINE GRAND JURY COMPLETES WORK; ADJOURNS

Prosecuting Attorney E. E. Kelly returned Thursday afternoon from a busy week spent at Grants Pass with the grand jury and prosecuting before the circuit court.

The two last indictments are against parties for the obtaining of money under false pretenses, but as the parties have not yet been apprehended, the names are not given to the public.

True bills were found against Everett Hogue of Kerby on two counts, one of selling liquor without a license, and another for giving liquor to a minor.

G. A. Baldwin, indicted on a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon, has entered a plea of not guilty and the trial of the case has been postponed till the next jury term.

ACCUSE HOLY ROLLERS OF CRUELTY TO CHILDREN

LOS ANGELES, Cal., April 25.—Alleging that cruelty to children is practiced by the "Holy Rollers" who are holding a convention here, Special Humane Officer D. F. McLaughlin has asked today that the practices of the sect be investigated by the grand jury.

The alleged cruelties, he declared, consisted partly of compelling small children to stand with uplifted arms "waiting for the power."

Many children, McLaughlin said, attended the meetings without their parents. He further stated that a "juvenile tent" is maintained at the convention encampment.

CARL GRAY PREDICTS 1913 A BANNER YEAR

PORTLAND, April 25.—That the fiscal year ending June 30, next will be the best in the history of the road was the statement today of Carl R. Gray, president of the Great Northern who is in Portland today on a tour of inspection.

"If the weather does not interfere with the present bright outlook for a good crop we will do as well in 1913 as we did in 1912," said President Gray. "Better than that we cannot expect, for the crop record last year was remarkable."

TARIFF CATECHISM BY PROTECTIONIST READ IN HOUSE

WASHINGTON, April 25.—During his speech on the Underwood tariff bill in the house today, Representative Moore of Pennsylvania put over a "tariff catechism."

"Why was the Payne bill passed?" asked the clerk. "Because the democrats continually misrepresented the tariff question," Moore answered.

"If the people enjoyed wonderful progress under the Payne law why did they complain?" "They listened to ambitious politicians, conscienceless agitators, and magazine essayists who found it more profitable to write fiction than to work, theoretical college professors, non-producers and a few sincere reformers who were misinformed and misled."

"What is the Underwood bill?" "A bill introduced by Representative Oscar Underwood, the exponent in the house of President Woodrow Wilson's theories."

SODA WATER BET CASE IS DISMISSED

Judge Kelly, who has returned from Grants Pass, states that the case against E. Gardner, who was convicted in the juvenile court on a charge of contributing to the delinquency of a minor, was dismissed, the prosecuting witness, Willard Crawford, having disappeared.

This case was the outcome of the prosecution for gambling last winter, Gardner having been a detective under the employ of the city, and his conviction was based on the evidence of Crawford, a minor, that he had been influenced to make a bet of a drink of soda water over the outcome of a game of billiards.

JAPANESE WELCOMED TO IDAHO LANDS

BOISE, Idaho, April 25.—The discussion aroused by the pending anti-alien land laws before the California legislature has today emphasized the fact that the recent legislature repealed laws prohibiting the ownership by aliens of lands in Idaho, so that Chinese and Japanese may hold all the land they can purchase in the state.

The laws were repealed on the recommendation of the governor on the ground that they deterred European capitalists from investing in the state. The repeals become effective May 1.

L. E. Yockey, formerly with the Ashland Tidings and later with the Ashland Record, has bought the Weed Lookout and left this week to take possession. He is succeeded with the Record by Mr. Swainson of Medford. Mr. Yockey is a brother of Helen Yockey, cashier of the Medford Mail Tribune.

BASEBALL TRUST IS GOOD THING DECLARES NAVIN

DETROIT, Mich., April 25.—Frank Navin, president of the Detroit Tigers of the American League, regarding the proposed congressional investigation of the so-called baseball trust spoke as follows:

"A real investigation and less continual harping upon a threatened investigation that does not go beyond threats, would be the best thing that could happen to baseball. The owners of baseball teams invite it."

"Baseball is controlled by a trust. That is admitted. But it is a beneficial trust. The present organization of baseball is necessary for its existence. So far as the reserve clause is concerned, baseball would die without it. This clause is that part of a player's contract giving a club the right to reserve his services for the coming year. He is paid for signing that contract and it is legal. If there were no such clause cities like New York, Chicago and Philadelphia would get all the stars and cities like Detroit get none. And as a result there would be no real contests."

NELLIE HART'S ASSAILANT IDENTIFIED AS JACK HALL

SEATTLE, Wash., April 25.—According to information in the hands of the police here today the man who shot Nellie Hart and then killed himself while in her room, is Jack Hall, 30, a shingle weaver. Hall was one of the men who went on strike at Ballard three weeks ago and he is said to have spent his time since wooing Miss Hart, whom he shot when she finally refused to marry him. The woman will recover.

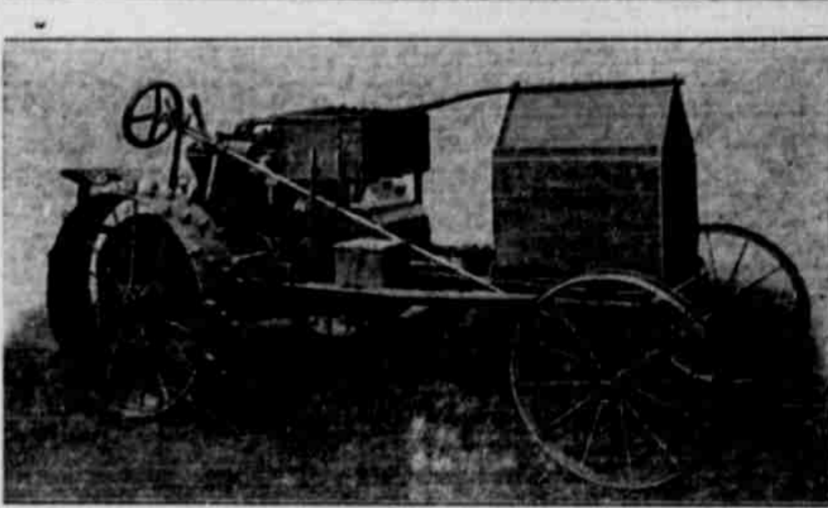
