MERCURY DROPS; SMUDGE POTS FIRED A threatening sky which prevailed Sunday over the valley accompanied by a sudden fall in temperature cleared Sunday night about 11 o'clock and left an opening for Jack Frost who descended upon the valley bent on mischief. Smudge pots over the valley were fired and no damage resulted according to local weather officials. Temperatures over the valley ranged from 26 to 30. The lower mark was touched for a short time only while the mercury stood for some time about 28. The temperatures reported today were as follows: Bear creek 26, Palmer 26, Webb 26, Allen 28, Potter & Gould 28, Potter Palmer 28, Fiero 28, Hillcrest 29, Barum 29, Tou Velle 30, Medford 30. Showers are predicted for tonight with Tuesday fair and warmer. MRS. BOURNE IS GRANTED DIVORCE PORTLAND, April 28.—Lillian Elizabeth Wyatt Bourne has been granted a divorce from Jonathan Bourne, Jr., after a hearing in Judge Gates' court. No alimony was allowed by the decree, as it was not asked. Mrs. Bourne refused to say anything about property settlement, but Frederick V. Holman, her attorney said that such arrangements had been made privately as to insure Mrs. Bourne an ample and liberal income. Mrs. Bourne told the court that when she married her husband he was practically "broke" as far as ready money was concerned, and that she used her money in helping him along. Later when they settled up she received her share in bonds, which he cautioned her to surrender under no circumstances. She asserted that Mr. Bourne lost his temper and berated her in the later years of her married life when she insisted on observing his caution to the extent of refusing to deliver the bonds over to him. Ex-Senator Bourne had made a general appearance through John M. Geurin, his attorney, so everything was clear sailing for Mrs. Bourne in securing the decree, which was practically by default, although the defendant, as a matter of form, interposed a demurrer, which was overruled. Mrs. Bourne testified that the divorce was collusive, but that she had genuine grievances, as set forth in her complaint. The burden of Mrs. Bourne's testimony was in substance as alleged in her complaint, filed April 7, 1913. Henrietta Grossman will continue her season until the middle of May.
