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TURKEY TROTTERS AND TANGO DANCERS IN RECKLESS AND DARING STEPS WHICH POLICE DON'T SEE



Tango dancing turkey trotting, and bunny hugging have run wild in New York since the beginning of the year. The raids on restaurants and dance halls running all night without licenses in the White Light district, ordered by Mayor Gaynor, only revealed to the public the extent and daring of the dances. Nor were the performances engaged in by persons of little reputation alone. There could be seen on the floors of many of these places, among them the most costly restaurants in the world, men and women from homes of respectability. They went through the same antics performed by denizens of the half world, against whom they brushed and jostled during the dance. In fact the dance halls of these expensive restaurants have been nightly the scene of mixed companies, out-of-town visitors, actresses, merchants, and their wives and professionals who make their living on Broadway and side streets. Of course there are resorts in every American city where scenes of more vulgarity and boldness are enacted, but these were not witnessed by respectable women. The curiosity in the New York obsession has been the willingness of women otherwise unimpeachable to take part. So far had the craze gone that when the police closed the all-night places many of them inaugurated afternoon dances, and the same scenes were enacted. So far the mayor has not decided to try to prevent these.

Y.M.C.A. BUILDING CORNER STONE IS LAID BY W. J. BRYAN

SACRAMENTO, Cal., April 29.—"Defining civilization as the harmonious development of the human race physically, mentally and morally," and declaring "that type highest in which the average threefold growth of its people is highest, I know of no other agency among men that stands so high in the advancement of civilization than the Young Men's Christian association," said Secretary of State William Jennings Bryan here today. Putting aside for an hour the cares of state which brought him to Sacramento as the special emissary of President Wilson to consult with the California legislature, Bryan laid the cornerstone of the new \$250,000 Y. M. C. A. building here and addressed the thousands who had gathered to witness the ceremony, on the importance of "filling as well as building such character factories." The only time during his talk the secretary of state in any way approached the grave matter which has called him here was when he referred to the influence the Young Men's Christian association exerted in "furthering the brotherhood of nations." "The only impulse," he declared, "which is strong enough to make a man sacrifice self in the interest of the many is spiritual development; it is the bond that links us to every other nation, and makes us call all peoples brothers."

WIRELESS STRIKE TO LEAD TO EMBARGO

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., April 29.—Either an embargo on local shipping or a speedy ending of the wireless telegraphers' strike here will result from the announcement made by Collector of the Port Stratton today that he intends to enforce the federal ruling that all wireless operators must have passed the regular government examination and secured licenses before they may take a position on a vessel. The collector puts a summary stop to the efforts of the Marconi company to supply the vessels affected with wireless students so they may maintain their schedules. Collector Stratton will refuse to grant clearance papers to ships not having regular licensed operators.

VICE RING EXPOSED IN STATE PRISON

SALEM, Ore., April 29.—Degenerate practices of William Quartier, better known as "Doc," the druggist employed at the state penitentiary for years, led to his arrest today on a felony charge. Information which led to the arrest of Quartier was furnished by a young convict employed in the hospital who is serving twenty years for horse stealing. Conclusive evidence was secured yesterday, and Quartier was arrested. Quartier nearly collapsed when he was formally accused at the penitentiary. The accusation was made under dramatic circumstances and he was led away a crushed and broken man.
