

ANTI-ALIEN BILL DRAWN BY WEBB TO BE ACTED UPON

SACRAMENTO, Cal., April 30.—The substitute anti-alien bill, prepared by Attorney General U. S. Webb, at the request of Governor Johnson and other progressives, and which will come before the senate for action tomorrow morning, follows:

Section 1.—All aliens eligible to citizenship under the laws of the United States may acquire, possess, enjoy, transmit and inherit real property, or any interest therein, in this state, in the same manner and to the same extent as citizens of the United States, except as otherwise provided by the laws of this state.

Section 2.—All aliens other than those mentioned in section 1 of this act may acquire, possess, enjoy and convey real property or any interest therein, in this state, in the manner and to the extent and for the purposes prescribed by any treaty now existing between the government of the United States and the nation or country of which such alien is a citizen.

Section 3.—Any company, association or organization organized under the laws of this state or state or nation, of which a majority of the members are aliens other than those specified in section 1 of this act, or in which a majority of the issued capital stock is owned by such aliens, may acquire, possess, enjoy and convey real property or any interest therein, in this state, in the manner and to the extent and for the purposes prescribed by any treaty now existing between the government of the United States and the nation or country of which such members or stockholders are citizens or subjects, and not otherwise.

Section 4.—Whenever it appears to the court in any probate proceeding that by reason of the provisions of this act any heir or devisee cannot take real property in this state, take real property in this state, which, but for said provisions, said heir or devisee would take as such, the court, instead of ordering a distribution of such real property to such heir or devisee, shall order a sale of said real property to be made in the manner provided by law for probate sales of real property, and the proceeds of such sale shall be distributed to such heir or devisee in lieu of such real property.

Section 5.—Any real property hereafter acquired in fee in violation of the provisions of this act by any alien mentioned in section 2 of this act, or by any company, association or corporation mentioned in section 3 of this act, shall escheat to and become and remain the property of the state of California. The attorney general shall institute proceedings to have the escheat of such real property adjudged and enforced in the manner provided by section 45 of the political code and title right, part 3 of the code of civil procedure. Upon the entry of final judgment in such proceedings the title to such real property shall pass to the state of California. The provisions of this section and of sections 2 and 3 of this act shall not apply to any real property hereafter acquired in the enforcement or in satisfaction of any alien now existing upon or interest in such property, so long as such real property so acquired shall remain the property of the alien company, association, or corporation acquiring the same in such manner.

Section 6.—Any leasehold or other interest in real property, less than the fee, hereafter acquired in violation of the provisions of this act by any alien mentioned in section 2 of this act, or by any company, association or corporation mentioned in section 3 of this act shall escheat to the state of California. The attorney general shall institute proceedings to have such escheat adjudged and enforced as provided in section 5 of this act. In such proceedings he shall determine and adjudge the value of such leasehold or other interest in such real property, and enter judgment for the state in the amount thereof, together with costs. Thereupon the court shall order a sale of the real property covered by such leasehold or other interest in the manner provided by section 1411 of the code of civil procedure. Out of the proceeds arising from such sale the amount of the judgment rendered for the state shall be paid into the state treasury and the balance shall be deposited with and distributed by the court in accord with the interest of the parties therein.

Section 7.—Nothing in this act shall be construed as a limitation upon the power of the state to enact laws with respect to the acquisition,

KILBANE RETAINS CHAMPIONSHIP OF FEATHERWEIGHTS

LOS ANGELES, Cal., April 30.—Johnny Kilbane of Cleveland retains the featherweight championship of the world today following a 20 round draw battle with Johnny Dundee of New York. The match was a footrace throughout practically every round, and the great crowd that expected to see a contest of championship caliber was genuinely disappointed.

Kilbane pursued the tactics that won him his battle with Abe Attell and the championship. He feinted, jabbed, trotted backward and jabbed again from going to going. He was far more clever than the challenger, but Dundee was willing and aggressive and was the sturdier of the pair. Kilbane tired badly in the final two rounds, in the last of which Dundee did much to overcome the lead on points which the champion had piled up in the previous sessions. Neither boy exhibited a punch of note. Kilbane's stabs did little more than worry Dundee. Nine out of ten of his blows were delivered going away and carried little steam. Dundee, while he landed infrequently on the phantomlike champion, apparently carried more power in his fists.

Kilbane left the ring unmarked save for a slight cut over the right eye. Dundee's right eye was badly battered and his mouth cut. At the outset Kilbane gave evidence that he intended to make the affair a boxing contest. As a master of pretty glove work he did everything that was expected of him, but in none of the 20 rounds did he fail to exhibit the unusual spectacle of a champion running away.

Referee Eytton's draw decision was well received by the big crowd. Further than to state that he believed he had piled up sufficient points to give him victory in spite of Dundee's fast finish in the 20th round, when the New Yorker fought the champion off his feet, Kilbane had nothing to say. Promoter McCarey is considering re-matching the boys for a June date.

ORPHISM SUCCEEDS FUTURISM AND CUBISM

PARIS, April 30.—Futurism and Cubism and all the rest of the "isms" have been laid in the shade by a new school of art entitled "Orphism." An "orphist" artist thus explains his craft:

"Look at this cubist canvas. What do you see? Why, a lot of paving stones, bricks, nursery blocks and what-nots. Isn't it so? And now glance at this futurist picture. After studying it for a few minutes you can find something which resembles and ear, a big toe, a worm or a fallen tree. The cubist calls his canvas 'The Nude Lady' and the futurist names his picture, 'Venice by Moonlight.' But all that is mere child's play.

"Look at this canvas. What do you see? Nothing. That's the point exactly. It is even devoid of color. It is not white, not black, nor yet blue, green, red or brown. It is nearly khaki, but it isn't khaki. It's blank—just plain blank. It requires great skill to mix the paints to get that effect and still greater skill to see what the picture represents when it is finished. Only the real artists, the connoisseurs with the trained eye, can name the subject. I call it 'Stamboul' now, but tomorrow—and there's the beauty of this very newest school of art—tomorrow, perhaps, I shall call it, 'Gabys Deslys.' However, I may think of a better name overnight so I will not promise now, what the name will be in twenty-four hours."
