

MERCURY DROPS LOW; SMUDGING IS VERY HEAVY

With the mercury in exposed spots standing at 23 from which point it ranged upward as high as 29 the coldest night of the frost season was experienced last night. Orchards generally smudged. Those in the foothills were not endangered. Those in the floor of the valley that did not heat suffered heavily, but the larger orchards were protected to such a degree that they will produce full crops.

The low temperatures recorded during the night were as follows: Hollywood, 28; Hillcrest, 29; "401", 27; Snowy Butte, 28; Potter & Gould 26; Talent, 29; Bear Creek, 23; Ross Lane, 27; Table Rock, 25; Eagle Point, 22; Brownsboro, 20; Medford, 28.

Smudging began about 2 a. m. in most sections and was general over the valley at 4:30 a. m. Fires burned until 7 o'clock. The smoke from the smudges settled over the valley leaving a coating of dirt over the homes of the city. The smoke did not clear away until after the noon hour Friday.

The damage was extensive in some of the smaller tracts where smudging was not carried on. In the orchards where fires were started the temperature was raised from 6 to 10 degrees.

Frost is predicted for tonight. It will not be as extreme as last night, however.

BOXING LEGISLATION IN CALIFORNIA FAILS

SACRAMENTO, Cal., May 2.—Many legislators predicted today that no anti-boxing measure will be passed by the California legislature at this session, following in the assembly late last night of Assemblyman Brown's drastic anti-boxing bill, limiting bouts to four rounds and making the participants and promoters of longer bouts guilty of a felony.

The bill was defeated 37 to 24, and friends of the boxing game declare the vote indicates that the bill introduced by Senator Brown, which has not yet passed in the senate, will never pass in the assembly.

Senator Brown's bill, however, has been amended to allow eight round bouts, and to permit an admission fee of twenty-five cents where the bouts are staged by organized clubs. The bill has been made a special order for eight o'clock.

SEEK KRUGER'S MILLIONS AND FIND SCOTT'S BODY

NEW YORK, May 2.—To search for \$2,500,000 believed to have been buried by former President Paul Kruger of the Boer republic on a coral reef in the Indian Ocean, and to recover, if possible, the bodies of Captain Robert F. Scott and his companions in the Ant-Arctic, an expedition headed by August DeCastellane Seymore of New York is en route today to San Francisco. The expedition will sail from that city to the Ant-Arctic regions.

MITSCHE TO OPEN NEW SEED AND FEED STORE

Leo J. Mitsche has rented the store east of the Star Theater for a seed and feed business. The new firm will be known as the Monarch Seed and Feed company and will handle a full line of garden and field seeds as well as chicken food and supplies. The store will be open for business on or before May 10. Mr. Mitsche, who has been a resident of Medford for the past three years, announces that it will be his business policy to satisfy customers or refund the purchase price. He solicits the patronage of the residents of the valley.

EARL ROGERS' DAUGHTER'S WEDDING ABRUPTLY HALTED

CHICAGO, May 2.—Her wedding to Ralph Wyant of this city halted by a chum of the groom-elect after it was declared the couple secured the license and minister, "just for a lark," Miss Adele Rogers, daughter of Earl Rogers, chief counsel in the defense of Clarence Darrow, is en route to her home in Los Angeles from here today. Miss Rogers appeared to be highly pleased at the abrupt halting of the wedding arrangements.

FRISCO LEADS IN NUMBER OF SUICIDES MEMPHIS IN KILLINGS

WASHINGTON, May 2.—California in general, and San Francisco in particular, are given the unenviable distinction of leading the country in the number of suicides, and Memphis in the number of murders, by census statistics for 20-odd states, published today.

Tuberculosis is the principal instrument of the grim reaper, according to the figures, and Denver leads the cities in the number of deaths from that disease, with 292 out of every 1,000 inhabitants. The statistics are based on mortality returns for 1911.

In that year there were 94,247 deaths from tuberculosis in the states included in the returns, the percentage being 15.9 for 1000 inhabitants. Organic diseases of the heart come second, with percentage of 14.9. The typhoid percentage is 21.

Albany, N. Y., has the highest percentage for heart disease, with 273.7 per cent, and Atlanta, Ga., the highest percentage for typhoid, with 66. Violent deaths took 84 per 1000 in the states mentioned.

Montana leads the accident and murder returns for states.
